### Meeting opened at 6:09 by Gaither

Pledge of Allegiance and attendance taken.

**Thompson:** Tonight, we are going to review our financials for May 2022. We are going to discuss a little bit of debt, share some exhibits with you, talk about a few revenue projections about the Kroger project and I had some historical spreadsheets to look at in terms of our income tax. There are a couple of legislations on for tonight. I have an exhibit for the tax budget that is attached to your documents we can get into after we get through the financials. Williams: Do you have the reports for March and April? Morgan: March you did get. This is April and May. Thompson: We can get them separate. Davis: The only thing I ask is that we have this ahead of time because I had time to look through. Thompson: The timing should be back on course. I know the last few months.... Hardin: I am going to ask one more thing; just like you ran down what we are going to go through, can we get that printed? Thompson: Okay. Our favorable ratio is 42%. Our general fund projected revenue is about \$10.1 million. Through 5/31/22, we had a little over \$4 million, so we had a .40%. It's not at .42% but I am not worried about how it's coming because our collections have been coming in pretty good. It may be just timing matters for that .02%. As we look at the expense side, what I do I provide every department and the appropriations we approved for the 2022 year. The expenses running through 5/31/2022 year to date shows by department. Most of the departments are doing pretty good. They stand below the 42%. The one with the Council Clerk at .46% and when I went back to look at that, we had a large payout last year for the previous Clerk. Her PERS payment came a little bit later, so that last quarter of the year had not hit, so that threw the ratio off through May. Legal admin was over a little bit. That may be associated with clearing out some Premier development type work that he was doing for the project. Normally the ratio favorable for the month is the .42%. Hardin: Is there anything big coming up? Thompson: I am sure he will have to do some legal advice concerning Kroger. He can probably brief you. Hardin: If we are already over, what is supposed to happen? Thompson: They could level out with Climer. I don't see it threatening the level we have for the year. Davis: So, you are attributing this increase for public land? Thompson: She jumped to public lands but I want to go back to legal because it was one of the ones that's over. Thompson: It was discussion about Climer's legal work. Davis: So, you think its attributing that to Premier, WM, etc? Thompson: Periodically, we review his bill that has a lot of details. I can provide those again, if you would like to see. I can run those by the month if you want to see his year-to-date stuff. Davis: And the dog warden; I am surprised we have that many? Thompson: That's through May. It's attributed to the contract amounts depending on what service they provide. Gaither: The dog warden goes through the police department. Thompson: It's a contract every year. I don't think his rates changed much. It may just be the activity they are running. They are in ratio. With public land and buildings, those are improvements. I didn't run a detail on that, but I can run it. But if you look at the overall general fund, it's at .32%. Davis: Finance at .35%, what are we doing with that and mayor's court, why are we paying that high? Is it just legal fees? Thompson: It is under the .42 but keep in mind the .35 we kind of evaluate that departments are not out of their range. So, finance is not overspending based on the appropriations that was appropriated. But the numbers you are seeing under the year-to-date column, that is like for the hole year and that includes payroll, pension payments, Medicare obligations, things like that. Hardin: Why do we allocate \$50,000 for auxiliary and there is only one person there? Thompson: I think the Chief explained there is only one and he likes to keep some of his appropriations in light of when he may have additional auxiliary. I am trying to recall his explanation. Hardin: Could

you ask him because we don't need \$50,000 and another \$30,000 sitting over there. That's a lot. Thompson: I don't think he will be at the meeting tonight, but I will consult with him. Williams: If we have money sitting there that we're not going to use and he knows he's not going to use it. And we talked about a contingency budget of \$1 million in 5 years, that could be where you could start with \$5,000 or \$10,000 as a line item. **Thompson:** I would like to revisit. I know he always has a pretty sound explanation of why he puts appropriations in place for the auxiliary. Williams: I recall that he was just going to keep it there and he wasn't going to use it. I'm saying if we know it's going to be sitting there at the end of the year, you have identified some funds that you could start that line item with. Thompson: Traditionally he is going to have one that is going to continue. Hardin: When are we going to be up to date with the reports? Thompson: This is through May, and we are closing June now. We won't have another meeting. The reports that are coming in now, you will be on vacation. Hardin: Here is what I am going to ask you to do. Even though we are on vacation, I still want those reports. Thompson: We are going to give you June in the next week. Hardin: And then you will be current. Thompson: Yes. Williams: When we return in August, we will return to a finance meeting in July, correct? Thompson: Yes. You return August 23rd, we will be able to cover both months. Hardin: Let's schedule it now with the understanding that we will get both reports. But in the meantime, we will get June. We will have a meeting August 23<sup>rd</sup> and the reports will be earlier. **Davis**: I want a chance to review them before the meeting. **Thompson**: You will have June pretty early and July. I think the legislation calls for something by the 15th of every month. I think the goal was trying to get everything the Friday before the meetings. We will get that back on course. Hardin: So, the system is in and everything? Thompson: The system is in. I got through all the May reports. June is going along pretty good, so we are really getting back up to snuff in terms of the timing of the reports. Davis: The senior van, do we have a new driver now? Thompson: It was always John Poindexter, Willie. John became ill and he retired. Then Nwoku was always part time and doing a good job. Now it's Nwoku who works Monday through Wednesday till noon and Willie pick ups at noon to the end of the week on Friday evening. We have 2. Hardin: Back to why you are leaving the money there unless you are going to.... Davis: It's at .31% so not too much under. We don't know how much gas. Thompson: Well, we can evaluate all of these as we move throughout the year. Through June would be a good target point. With John being such a long-time person in terms of salaries but when I looked at this, I am pretty sure I had it for the 2 individuals. I know we have had a lot of repairs lately and I know that is some of that on there. Davis: So, that's gas, repairs.... Thompson: ...and the salary of two individuals. Davis: Bedford Schools-there is nothing on here. Is that the summer program? Thompson: No. We will be making the payments. When the Mayor makes this CRA agreements and revenue share with the schools, we wait through June, so the RITA income tax is all the way through, and people have filed all their returns. Then we go back and do the revenue sharing based on how the Mayor did the deal. Depending on what companies we did the deal with, that accumulates to the amount we have to pay back to Bedford Schools for the revenue sharing. That will be coming up by the end of July. You will see that in July's report. Davis: And summer employment? Thompson: No summer employment person. Sometimes we used to have a person here helping Debbie and that hasn't happened. She was utilized in different areas. Davis: So, recreation would be.... Thompson: Recreation is under their 204. Davis: They just started their summer program so this wouldn't show the summer program for rec. Thompson: It goes up through May, but I do have some of the numbers of what he spent in June as I move on to the rec area. We haven't collected much through May. Keep in mind that the Senior Fund and the Recreation Fund are those funds where we subsidize with transfers from the General Fund to the different funds. Now, like you said, there is not much revenue there because like you said, the programs didn't start till June in terms of what we collected for the rec programs and there was a daycare they paid for. Hardin: Where do we show 501(c)(3) funds? Thompson: 501(c)(3) funds are never show up on our books. That's the Mayor's non-profit that he has under his own financials for himself personally. It's always been that way. 501(c)(3) donations that a lot of the companies make. He sends out his letters before the concerts and then send donations to him. That will never be on our books. Hardin: Okay, so we are not accountable for all of that? Thompson: No. Hardin: Do you not show that certain things were covered by the 501(c)(3)? Thompson: Not for the 501(c)(3). He has his own account for that. We do show that you pass through legislation there is \$15,000 that you give him every year for those concerts. That's what I do have an account of. But that 501(c)(3) is his personal, privy, private financial information for that organization. Hardin: If something is paid out of those funds, and the question is asked, 'How is that paid for,' that is the explanation. Thompson: Yes. I don't have all the documentation. Hardin: No problem. Thompson: The revenue is showing senior fund and rec fund. There is minimal being reported there at this point. On the expenses, the senior fund, \$28,134.15, and the rec fund through May, he's used \$26,668(.85) so far. **Davis:** Why did we use so much in the rec? **Thompson**: A lot of that is Carlean's salary. You can look at it in the big report. On page 15-16, you can go to the year-to-date expenses, and you can see the majority of it is wages which is pretty much Carlean. Another big portion of it is fitness instructors for the seniors. The salaries are \$19,900, the fitness instructor \$5,600, little bit of repairs and maintenance, gasoline. Davis: Is gasoline just Carlean's? Do we only pay for gas from here to the community center? **Thompson**: It can be the community center.

Sometimes the Mayor sends her on scout missions to go and check venues of where she is going to take the kids. Gaither: The event that is coming up Friday, she has to go around and check all these places; Painesville, Madison, at these wineries. Thompson: She will be paid mileage by the IRS ruling. Davis: The fitness instructors: \$5.600. Thompson: That is throughout through May for general recreation. Williams: What's under miscellaneous contractual for recreation? **Thompson**: She probably has cellphone every month.... Williams: There is a cellphone line item down below. Davis: But it has zeroes in it. Williams: But if there is a line item, it should be there. Thompson: I can run the detail between the meetings. Usually under there we may put copier agreements, but to be exact, I will have to run the detail for you. Hardin: Have we started that program with the cycling? Thompson: No. I know the Mayor discussed this with me before that the gentleman is a little worried about his machines if the senior break them or something like that. He has been throwing around the fact he's looking to buy 3-4 of our own machines to have our own cycling program with Carlean. Williams: Was there any explanation as to why he meant the seniors would break them? Thompson: I wasn't there. Gaither: I was there. He complained. I think he has cheap machines and the little holsters that hold your feet, some of them fell off the machines. Some of them were crooked and tipping so I don't think we should do that venue. Williams: So, they don't seem safe for our seniors. Gaither: It's his business but.... Williams: The proposition was for us to buy cycles for his business? Thompson: No. After he (Mayor) talked to that gentleman, I didn't have the conversation with him. This was in terms of me and the Mayor that he thought it was a good idea for the Village may buy some cycling machines for the seniors. This was speculative but I do know he had the conversation with the gentleman that he was concerned about the equipment. That's just something we were considering. Hardin: When did we buy those machines that's over in the community center? Thompson: I haven't been down there in a while. Are there treadmills and things? Gaither: There is a treadmill and the cycle and rowing machine. Hardin: When did we get that? Thompson: I will check on the machine date purchases. I do have the miscellaneous contractual. There was a DJ service twice sometime in February. I know on one of the upcoming trips he's going to have some kind of DJ/MC person. That was \$150 apiece. Then there looks like there was some marking dust bought for \$276 they used in recreation. That came up to the \$600. Davis: Your next item, camp transportation, but we don't have any line items for that. We don't do that separately; how much it costs for the busses to transport them to all their camp things? Thompson: We consolidated all that under the summer camp line item. Davis: Then the Cuyahoga County Development Grant; why do we have a line item for that? Do we usually get money from that, or do they usually have somebody has a disability? Thompson: We have to have two sides to it where we took in the revenue and made expenses against it. It may be a line for a previous program. I don't see anything, but I will make note of that one. Williams: Do you know if we still have the refund program? **Thompson**: We book those under Healthy Oakwood under 1017799 on page 13. **Davis**: The rec department, the office supplies is up to 132%. What office supplies puts you way over in the amounts? Plus, gasoline is almost 90% of the budget. **Thompson**: The office supplies are only \$50. **Davis**: She spend \$30 out of \$50 but it says 132%. Are we going to be out of whack all year because it's only May? Thompson: We will just realign within the budget. We had \$50 there and she had \$66. Looks like she had a nameplate engraving under Gino's. We'll just bring it back in line but I won't move the total amount allocated to the recreation fund was \$280,000. Some of the areas it may not be used so I will just realign on that line item. Hardin: For every expenditure, there is a purchase order is there not? Thompson: Yes, there is a purchase order. Hardin: And the person who signs off on purchase orders is who? Thompson: The directors put in a purchase requisition, we turn it into a purchase order and my name is the final name going on the purchase order when it is complete. Hardin: How many of you have credit cards? Thompson: I got one, Carlean, Fire Department.... Hardin: We can stop right there. Thompson: We do have legislation listing who has credit cards and who don't. Hardin: So, when Carlean spends something on her credit card, does she have to get pre-approved? Thompson: Yes, she will have a quote that puts the purchase requisition in place, that turns into a PO which gives the green light for the vendor for the services. Hardin: I have been sitting here a long time and I kind of thought so but that hasn't changed. Davis: Tonight, we have finance in that one ordinance.... Thompson: Both ordinances are finance tonight. Davis: But that one is mixed. It's got 5 different subjects in it. One is your finance but then there are other things in it. Can somebody tell me why we have so many mixed things in one ordinance? It seemed way too much to me. Thompson: We have a bond counsel that looks over our bonds. I guess it's the language they have to put in place. Periodically, every time we roll those notes, we may have bought vehicles, fixed streets, etc. They have to list everything. Davis: It just seemed like so many items in one. Thompson: There is always lengthy wording when we go through that bond process. Hardin: What's our rating? Thompson: Our rating with S&P is A-. They give us a report every year. Some of the other information I was providing, I just gave you a little summary or graft of the income tax collection over the last 20 some years. If you hone in on the right, you kind of see how we were moving up over \$7 million in 2019. Of course, COVID hit in 2020 which brought it down through 2021, we started making some trend back in the other direction. When you read this, the corporate withholding in the blue that we get from all the companies, the profits are in the yellow and the residents is a small portion of what we collect is in the purple. There was a question about the Kroger project revenue.

I did a one pager to reiterate how the deal went. The payroll withholding is \$450,000 is what we are expected to get based on a guaranteed \$18 million payroll. \$165,000 from TIFF with a guaranteed \$615,000 yearly. Davis: How come we don't have anything from McBee on what we are expecting? Thompson: I will go back to the Mayor's exhibit and see what he did. I don't think they had a guaranteed version on theirs. Sometimes historically I look back at the historical withholding since I have access with the program in RITA. That can kind of give us an indication. I am sure they stated with the Mayor. A lot of times when they say they have so much income, we can go back and spot check what they have been turning in to the RITA system. Now we can jump to the debt portion. The amortization schedule that we show our payments pretty much simultaneously. Every June and December I have to make these semiannual payments. This show the categories of the payments that I make throughout the year. I have a single sheet showing the total that we got, and the bonds are at \$2,275,000.00 and the notes are at \$1,975,000.00 which is \$4,250,000.00. In servicing this debt, this is the amortization schedule where I make my payments. We got a year we will be retiring this series 2003. Every year we pay down \$428,000 a year. Then on the notes, I am paying down \$225,000 a year. So, in total I am paying down \$653,000 on the notes and the bonds. Hardin: So, you think you will have series 3 paid off by when? Thompson: Next year in December, that will be paid off. When we pay off that first part, it will free up \$100,000 that I won't be paying. Davis: So, do you divide it up and put more towards the other ones? Thompson: That may be something to put in the capital improvement for a new city hall. But I won't have that obligation until after 2023. Hardin: To me, this is the best thing you have ever given me. Thompson: I know you like that report. It's a really good model to follow. Hardin: I really appreciate this. It will help make a decision and Candace is \*inaudible-background noise\* and Councilperson Gaither is saying we need the municipal building too. So, I would hope whoever is here at the end of the year, will remind us we retired this series 3 and, in the meantime, we don't take on anything else. Then we will know, at least put \$25,000 in each of those funds to start the fund. **Thompson**: To have those additional dollars start accruing for the new city hall in our capital account which is our 401 account. Hardin: Because in 2023, there is nothing totally retired again until '27. Thompson: Yes, Hardin: This gives everyone an idea of where we are and when we get something to work with, we should all remember that. And you at the Finance Director, you know what we are asking you to do. We have been saying this for a couple of years. Thompson: I have had a lot of conversation even with the bond counsel and just with looking at our profile, they are saying it will probably be, when we look at it financially, we definitely would be able to maintain that million dollars in the general fund. Then start to take some dollars and put into the capital improvement. But definitely freeing up this debt obligation can be a start. Hardin: When you are talking on our behalf, you are the one talking to debt counsel. Let them know this is 3 years (banging) going down the line and neither one of those are happening. Now that we are coming into this windfall, I will speak for myself; I have a lot of designs on that money. We all have ideas on what we want to do. And we still have the exterior maintenance program sitting on the shelf back here which started in 4 and we've got to do the rest of the wards. Thompson: In terms of previous plans for city hall? Hardin: The exterior maintenance program we extended. So, all of that is sitting there waiting for funding. Thompson: Just to wrap up, I have this tax budget exhibit for one of the legislations tonight. Just an annual piece of information I submit to the county. Just for your information, I gave you a quick synopsis of what a tax budget does and it's a really good explanation. It doesn't appropriate anything for the current upcoming year, but you can see 1-3 what the tax budget does. If you flip through a couple of pages, it says the Division of Taxes Levied, those rates have been there for some time. Remember throughout the year, we sign that tax rate resolution by every council member. So, I am reiterating it. They actually send me a Schedule A and they show me the value of the village and the tax rates we have in place. So, I just reiterate the information that has been provided and put the anticipated revenues from the sources. The Unvoted General Obligation Debt, I put the numbers that we just discussed in terms of how much we owe in our debts, our notes, and our bonds and put what we have to service for the upcoming year to pay principal and interest. The last page is statement of activity showing all our funds. I have to provide them with what the balances were at the beginning of this year, the general property tax, the local government is provided from the county, so I resubmit those and then put other sources in place for upcoming '23. This something we do every year around this time. Hardin: So, you're saying your format is changing? **Thompson**: No, the format is not changing. It's still the same format. I submit to them by July 20<sup>th</sup>. Davis: So, July 20th you send this to them, but it has the unencumbered balances as of January 1st and then it goes to July 20th? **Thompson**: No. They want the balances from the beginning of this year. They gave me the perpetual property taxes collected for '23. This just shows the resource potential anticipated for 2023. Williams: You have some new reports that you don't usually provide. Is this due to the new system? **Thompson**: It could be. We put those together and it may be like the reports you were getting before. We always show the state of cash position, the refund, the revenue summary, the expense for all funds, and I think that is all we have. You have all that before, but it does look different, and we do print those back-to-back to shorten the report. Williams: And now we have the expense report with the encumbrance details which you have already spent against each of these funds through May? Thompson: Yes, through the current. Williams: And are you showing us the check detail for every vendor for the entire month? Thompson: Is

that passed out to you, Christine? I don't think I passed that out. Morgan: That is what was given to me by Ralph. Thompson: Okay. That would show all the checks. I think we had a report that showed all the checks, and we discussed it before. We keep going back and forth but that is the information. Williams: I prefer not to go back and forth anymore. I prefer to see this every month, but can we have it from January to April as well? Thompson: Do you want it separated by month or just...? Williams: No, separated by month. Thompson: So, January through April and provided every month. Williams: When we get back, it will be August, so can you just bring us up to date so we have May.... **Thompson**: Whatever we discussed in the finance meeting, I will bring them all the way current; separate months. Williams: Got it. Thank you!! Davis: But we will have that before our meeting so we can look it over. Thompson: Yes. Williams: And then this expense audit trail report. Can you explain what this is because this is the first time I've seen this. Thompson: When you get this audit trail report, it will show everything for the month that totals up.... Davis: Does that say what page it is? (Williams showing Davis). Thompson: This expense audit trail report is going to be your drill down to see what exactly spent in that line item that's in the bold black and it will show encumbrances, invoice numbers. It's just a more detail way to show you what happened in the month. And this report is going to tie up to your monthly numbers on your report. Williams: I have not seen it like this before. So, this is for every fund or is this a specific fund? Thompson: We have to process and run it for every fund. I don't know if you got the complete.... Williams: Yeah, because it can't be complete. It's too tiny to be complete for every fund. Thompson: It can be run for every fund and every line item will be really big.... \*inaudible-both Williams & Thompson\* Williams: What is that? You don't know what that is? Thompson: No, it's showing you everything that has been spent on every line item in the whole budget for the village. You can get that on every line item that we have in this big book. What we can do is we can run revenue, too. But what you do is you separate your revenue reports in the report you got, and the encumbrance detail will show you everything on these lines in detail on here. Williams: This is the summary of this (other report)? Thompson: Yes. Williams: Got it. Thompson: Yes, and it will tie up your month to date expenses. Davis: On your expense audit you have landscaping Kroger site. Why are we paying for the Kroger site to be landscaped? **Thompson**: He goes through some beautification over there. I think Tommy and them put some annuals for the year so that's the charge for the flowers, too. Williams: In the amount of \$225,000? Thompson: That \$215,000 you have to realize under 201 that is our streets as well. So, that \$215,000 is a payment to Vallejo. It's one of the paving contractors. We pay those out per legislation that Ed had in place before he went to the bid process and that was the payment to that paving company. Gaither: We will have to start the meeting. Thompson: But a lot of those come back from reimbursement from the county when he talks about grants and things like that. But that was just a payment. Davis: But \$3,000 for Kroger? That is what we had to pay for landscaping the Kroger site? Thompson: That was in May? Yeah, he would have bought some things for the Kroger site.

### Meeting opened approximately 7:03 by Gaither

Pledge of Allegiance and attendance taken.

Motion to approve the minutes from the June 28, 2022, Council meeting by Callender; Seconded by Matlock VOTE YES: Gaither, Callender, Hardin, Matlock, Davis, Williams

### Clerk Correspondence:

**Morgan:** Birthday wish to Councilperson Williams; 1 year anniversary for the Clerk and notification that Clerk will not be in attendance for the 8/23/2022 meeting due to CMC event.

### **Departmental Reports:**

Marinucci-Building: I don't have any report today, but I did send a report on the rental properties. Gaither: What does it mean when you say, "owner must pay back permits that they did not pay?" Marinucci: I can't think of the gentleman's name (Nordonia Hills Properties). He is a slum landlord. He gave us a check and it bounced. So, we have issues regarding that and we're going after him. Davis: Has he already been cited? Marinucci: He has not been cited yet; it's in the works. Hardin: If we are aware of properties that are rental properties that are not on this list.... Marinucci: Please let us know. Hardin: That was number 1. Number 2, I was speaking to someone else regarding properties that are not just LLCs. But let's start with LLCs. When you track them down and you are having difficulty narrowing down who owns them and some of them are out of the country. We have our ordinances here. If I live in Spain and I own property on Lynbrook Drive, I could probably care less what it looks like. Marinucci: Correct. Hardin: That is not good for us here. Regarding the POS, do you have any way to require if it's rental property, that by law or ordinance, to require that we have an accurate way of reaching the owner or management company; or requiring that there is a management company in place local? Marinucci: The answer to that is yes. Some of these LLCs give us a property manger that is local. The problem is all paperwork is done and a year from now when the issues surface, the management company is no where to be found. The property that we are dealing with it's out in Israel and the local managing agent, Lori Young, who is a realtor, they are selling the property. I have been in touch with her nonstop. I am making sure that whoever buys that particular property has to assume the violations and cannot rent it out until all the violations are completed. The issue that you have is that the person who is living in it has to move out. That's one of the issues that's on the table. Matlock: Let me ask you a question; the property we are talking about, in the meantime while they are selling this property, are they obligated to go in and make some repairs to that property? Marinucci: None of that is being done. They are going to get the buyer to assume the violations. Matlock: What if there is no buyer within a period of time? Marinucci: I don't know. We will look at it when we get to it. \*inaudible-multiple voices\* Mayor: ... all this talk. Marinucci: This is just hypothetical. Mayor: Let's just sink our teeth into the legislation that we have for council to pass on. Up until now, there have been penalties when our service department cuts the grass, and they tack it on to the bill when it's been sold. I want more teeth than that and a lot more readiness going on in many communities

now. We have to do something about it. Let's get some legislation with some real teeth in it to deal with this right up front rather than have to wait 6 months before the place looks like heck. Hardin: The purpose of me bringing this up today is just what you said. Even to the point, Mr. Law Director, I want to start with whatever we come up with locally. I think we should refer to counties and state because this in ongoing. This is not going to stop. I am aware of another property if I am not mistaken, it's Switzerland, Spain, some foreign country, and it's in my ward. I am concerned about the entire village. This is going to become the norm I am afraid. And if you think of other countries, you are not allowed to buy property in other countries. We are very liberal, and we allow other countries to buy property. As a result, the little people as usual will suffer. I would like for us to draw up an ordinance that can be enforced. We can get creative. Just like if rent a property, I have to put down a deposit and heaven knows I don't like this because we have rental property. But if it means as a landlord, make me put up a bond of some amount so if I don't fix it, you have some money to work with. These are the kinds of things I think through because this is not going to stop. This is going to become what we have to live with. In the last 3-4 months, I have had 4-5 homes change hands. Now, it's still America and I don't have to live in it and I can rent them out if I want to and I think that is what's about to happen. We are going to see the whole complexion of this community start to change. Mayor: The people that go in there don't have any sweat equity, so they don't care. Hardin: This is what I had on my mind today to ask the Council and the law director to start coming up with legislation and if we want to be the first in this county to have something of this nature, that is so finite Mr. Law Director. We need it. Climer: In answer to your first question, foreign corporations and LLCs operating in the state should have a statutory agent appointed that noticed with the Secretary of State for service of process or other items that need to be served. It generally means to get served what you need served to enforce our ordinances. But we will look at redrafting and getting creative. Hardin: And hit them in the pocketbook because they are filthy rich. They send a drone over and they buy it up because the don't care. They have the money. But if have them put enough money to keep it up so by the time you find them, we won't have to look at the mess. Davis: Are the Nordonia Hills Properties, is that just over here on Macedonia? Marinucci: That's Sablanski (sp) if I am saying it right. Davis: It doesn't have a name, just says Nordonia Hills Properties. There are 4 of them. All 4 of them owe money to the city for all their permits. That's been since March. That's been a long time. Gaither: Well, that is this year. We don't know about previous years. Marinucci: We have hit them the last couple of years. That one the check bounced so we have to find out what's going on. Gaither: In your monthly report, can you include any POS that you issue and the occupants you issue them to; the properties? That's lets us know what's being sold and also the occupancy permits for whoever is coming into the village. Marinucci: I'll run the reports. We are having trouble with that, but we'll see how it turns out. When you hit a occupancy report, it is giving you everything. I am having trouble with it. For instance, if I say give me residential occupancy report between the time period, it's giving me stuff that shouldn't be in there. That's the problem I'm having. But I'll run it again and see. Williams: Who have you contacted to resolve that? Marinucci: It's been going on for over a year. Between the IT guys and the management company, the people that run the software. And too, recently, you get money off it so when you called me the other day regarding the rental property and who paid and who didn't pay, I didn't know until that time we could pull up the dollars. I think that's worked out now. Tom was here today. Gaither: The system you have now, is it able to accomplish what you need? Marinucci: It's getting there. It's getting more and more cultured to what we need. Gaither: Monthly we will get POS and the occupancy? Marinucci: I don't know if I can run the POS, but I will try. If the computer doesn't generate it, then I can't get it for you. Gaither: But you do issue them? Marinucci: All the time. Gaither: So, you do know what POS are being issued. Marinucci: What I don't know is if the computer is capable of running a POS report. I will try. Gaither: But you know when you issue a POS? Marinucci: Yes, all the time. Gaither: Okay, it can even be manual. Just write down the address of what you did the POS on. Marinucci: Maybe. I definite maybe. Matlock: Manually you cannot provide us per month, who is actually doing a point of sale? It has to be some sort of tracking mechanism. Marinucci: I'll check the computer and get back to you. Matlock: Now with the computer, if the computer is not giving it to you, you should have something manually available. Marinucci: This is what I am going to do; I will check the computer and get back to you. I don't think we are setting up special data bases doing it manually. I don't know. It's very awkward. But when it comes in, for a POS, it goes into the computer. I just don't know if I can run the report on it. I will know first thing tomorrow morning if I can try and run the POS. And I can get back to you on it. And I'm not going to lockdown Aaron doing everything we are doing to get a manual report. We are swamped right now, but I will do my best. Matlock: I'm not trying to make you frustrated, I am just saying per month, people who move in OV, a POS, there is not tracking mechanism. Marinucci: I don't know. Matlock: Then how do you know who is moving in and who's moving out? Marinucci: I don't know. We get a phone call from a realtor or an owner that selling the property, it's put into the computer. I just don't know if we can track that mechanism. Williams: I hear what you're saying but if you can't do it in the computer, how many people do you have in that building? Marinucci: Counting me, 4. Williams: So, with 4, if you can't do it through the computer,

what role can your team of 4 figure out...? Marinucci: I'll figure it out. Williams: Because I feel like I hear you say you are not going to do it if you can't do it through the computer. Marinucci: I don't know where I am at on it. Once I figure it out, I can see if I can run on it. All I can say is this: I don't know why you need a POS but if I can get it to, I will get it to you. Matlock: I can tell you why we need one; because we really want to know who is moving into our wards. Marinucci: A POS doesn't tell you who is moving in. Matlock: I'm asking you as a question of who is moving into our wards, who's moving out of our wards. That's simple. Marinucci: To tell who how is moving in, that is a certificate of occupancy. I can run that. When I ran it two months ago, I hit certificate of occupancy, permits came out with it. I asked for residential and commercial came out with it. It was a lot of stuff that wasn't what you required. That's what happened with that issue. A POS, I hope can get it but a POS just tells the property that is going to a real estate agent for sale. I'll try to get that. Williams: I thought we budgeted money for new software recently. If we are paying for it and it's not working for us, I don't know how we elevate this, but to say that a system that we pay for with village funds is still now working after a year or several years, it's not a sufficient response. We have to find a way to get that resolved. We can't go on for years saying it isn't working. We are paying for it to work. Marinucci: It does work but it may not give you what you are asking for. Williams: Then it doesn't work. Marinucci: When you're looking at the building department that has A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K and you're at L, it may not get you L. Thompson: You may be able to get through it with Tom. Marinucci: We have been working on it. Tom has been here all day today. Thompson: We will pose it to him. Marinucci: This has been ongoing getting you everything you need. And there is no other software that you think you can get to think you're going to have all your bases covered because a couple months ago when the Mayor requested it, Tom (IT), serves Solon, Macedonia, Mentor, Painesville, the whole area. We got the pros and cons all over and done but what we decided to do was stay where we're at. Summitt County spent \$50,000 trying to update their and they didn't get it done. So, where we are at on it is making what we have work. I will try to get you a POS. Mayor: And the certificate of occupancy, that is what they are looking for too. Marinucci: They will get that first thing in the morning. Mayor: At least have that. Marinucci: You may have to do a certificate of occupancy that is so many pages long. You will have to go through and figure out what is yours. That you will have tomorrow morning. Matlock: Okay. Gaither: Let me ask you this question: Normally when a property is sold in a community, whatever community, the title company will not transfer that property without the community saying a POS has been done and we cleared it. So, how do you let them know? Marinucci: We send it to them. When a call comes in for a POS, the inspection is done, the report comes in that is emailed to the owner and title company. The title company won't close without the POS. That's when they come in to say, 'Would you agree to allow the buyer to assume the violations?' Gaither: So, at what point do you get that information to the title company if you can't tell them when you get the POS? Marinucci: We tell them. Gaither: That's what we're asking. Marinucci: No, you're asking if I can generate a report. That's all I'm saying. Gaither: Well, how do you notify the title company? Marinucci: The owner comes in to fill out the paperwork and it's the owner has to give it to the title company. But the title company is calling the office. Gaither: They are supposed to call your office. Marinucci: They do. Gaither: Okay, and either you tell them that it's clear or it's not clear. No, we gave them a copy of their report. Gaither: But you have to clear it before they allow the property to transfer. Marinucci: The buyer comes into the office to sign an affidavit agreeing to assume all the violations and the violations are taxed. We give me 90 days to fix them. Gaither: At that point, you let the title company know the property transfer. Marinucci: Yes. Gaither: When you are able to let the title company know that the POS violations have been done or are being assumed, that's the report we are asking for. And we don't need the report, we need to know the properties that are being done on. Marinucci: It will be easier if I can.... Hardin: We don't want you to run it, just write it down. So, if 3 people give the okay, just go around to each desk and get the names. Just write them down. We don't need a report. \*inaudiblemultiple voices\* Marinucci: I am not a dumb person. I can handle this. \*inaudible-multiple voices\* Marinucci: I will handle this. I will do something about it. Davis: If you give a rental/lease permit, does that include a certificate of inspection and a certificate of compliance? Marinucci: We are not allowed on the inside unless we get permission. The rules changed on that, so we don't. The certificate of compliance, we can only get in if they allow us in. We got in to the one you are familiar with. They asked us to come in. So, the \$100 is...? Marinucci: The \$100 is every landlord on a yearly basis has to pay the village \$100 as a rental fee to rent the house. Davis: So, you can't do an inspection on the inside? Marinucci: We can't get in on the inside. Gaither: You can only do an external. Climer: There were some court decisions that basically held that a POS inspection is a violation of the 4th amendment, unless you enter with a warrant, or you have the permission of the occupant or the owner. Davis: It just seems so sad that we are letting people rent houses and not knowing that the house is safe or not safe or clean or electricity. Climer: I don't disagree. Unfortunately, the courts have made their decision and that makes Dan's job more difficult. Gaither: He can only do external. Climer: Now you can if you believe there is probable cause to believe that there are violations within the house based on that inspection inside the house, then you can apply for an administrative warrant. But this all gets very

time consuming and expensive. Marinucci: And we did that on the Columbus property. Davis: Yes. Mayor: What does it cost to get an administrative warrant to get inside a house? Climer: It's not a huge monetary amount. Mayor: Then why can't we have that as part of the legislation getting more teeth in this. In other words, if this is going to happen on a POS, we are going to have an administrative warrant to go inside the house. Climer: You can't say, 'Judge, I want to go inside this house' as a matter of course. You have to have some probable cause, reason to believe that there is a violation within the house. Marinucci: And it has to be a serious violation. It's not going to be chipped paint. Hardin: Not to be smart, but how did Cleveland do it? Climer: I am not sure the mechanism they are using or where they are going to do these lead inspections. Hardin: Well, let's check it out because they are going in and out. Climer: We will check it out. Marinucci: The Columbus Road property, the way we got in was there an exterior well that was a safety and health hazard. Some kids could get in and drown. That is why the judge granted it. During that proceeding, and I was at the proceeding, it was not a carte blanche administrative warrant. He limited it to that one issue. Hardin: I agree with the Mayor. If they do it in Cleveland, then let's figure out how they did it so we can do it too. Mayor: And anywhere in the United States, let's see what's going on. Hardin: That is the objective. Marinucci: One last thing, I have been trying to get you a list of vacant properties and where I'm going to start with the landbank. When we get a foreclosure, if there is a building there, is it vacant? That is one way. I will put that together too. Only one thing too; if the village doesn't want the property, they can sell it to the neighbors I believe on a first come, first served.

Service-Haba: I have been thinking about this for a few months. I asked Ed and he said it really wasn't up to him. I imagine it's going to be up to Council and the Mayor. The problem is the landbank we keep giving them away to our next-door neighbors. The one on Glenshire that is 3-4 lots up from Forbes, you can probably get \$30,000-\$40,000 for that lot. The land is in our name. It's in our landbank; we just keep cutting it year after year after year. I am asking maybe Mr. Law Director to tell us what to do to get a realtor to take this thing out of OV's name to sell it and get a good price for it instead of us giving it away to the neighbors. Hardin: And it is a buildable lot. Climer: We are happy to set the program up. We have sort of a program in place for the stray properties that are not buildable. We have been trying to offer them to the two neighbors to divide it up, but there have been any bites on it. Hardin: Some one had ask you about that and you told them what to do. Mayor: It has been some time. Hardin: I don't know anything about it. Haba: There are a few even. Maybe the law director can look into it. Hardin: And since we are talking about land, at the end of Milburn \*inaudible-multiple voices\* Hardin: But some of that land in between there is it associated with that last house? When you're coming down Milburn, the house on the left, is that associated with some of his land? Haba: I believe some of it is because we used to cut it for the elderly woman, give her a freebie once a year. I think part of that was hers. Haba: The only other thing I have is the walking path with 3 bridges on it; the big one by Grove, Forbes, the medium size one over on Richmond and the small one by the creek on Oak Parkway. A couple of the boards that we placed 2 years ago, came up in the past week. The last couple of days some of our guys got rid of the bad wood and replaced with good wood. In the next week, we are going to put stand and preservatives on that one. \*inaudiblemultiple discussions\* Hardin: Mayor, we need paint. Are we going to paint the bridge? Haba: Yes. Hardin: I am talking about the bridge on Forbes. Haba: Yes. Hardin: And the real reason for me coming to the meeting tonight is to talk to you and the Mayor. You know why? They finally finished the project on Forbes. That is the most unsightly mess down there. Mayor: They're not done. Hardin: Let me finish. When the beautification part starts, because they are still doing stuff over there, the new device they put in over there is not noisy. Thank you for that. But what are you going to do about some beautification of that cage or whatever it is? Haba: I don't recall for sure but there is landscape money in that project. Hardin: That is the intent. Haba: I'll look it up for you. Davis: What do we charge for vacant properties cutting grass and are we getting the money returned? Haba: In September, we give a list of everything we cut. Erica has been doing a nice job the last month getting notices out to people. I told her we have to get them out every 2 weeks was impossible to do that. Do it one more time and let the people know. I know they are giving notice. We charge \$150/hour minimum. At the end of the year if no one gives us money, we will do that. Then we give the list to Brian, and he sends it out to the county to put on the taxes. Thompson: I see them on my settlement sheets, and I do see grass cutting coming income coming in. Davis: My second question, do we allow any camping to go on in our park? Haba: No necessarily. I know the 4<sup>th</sup> of July.... **Davis**: I went up there to look at the pavilion for my mom and I seen campers. Who gives permission? Mayor: It's tradition. They have been doing it for over 5 years. They are OV residents and church members. Williams: I called the City of Bedford about that one area.... Haba: \*inaudible-mumble\* We've cut back on the right side.... Williams: I'm not asking you to cut it. But it's not our property; it's Bedford, right? Haba: We cut back to make Wright Ave look a little better on the corner there. I went by there today and one of my guys looking at a job, even though it's Bedford's side, next time we're out there, I told the guy to cut it back. Williams: But it's a big plot of land and it's all Bedford's, right? Haba: I am not positive; I believe it's 90-95%. Williams: I thought it

was. Okay, I will call them again. I did call but I wanted to make sure before I call. **Haba**: I told the guy next time he's there to cut those lots in the Wright/Free area to cut it back. **Gaither:** Dan is going to generate a list of vacant properties he is aware of. If you see any, you can let the building department know so he can add it to his list.

**Thompson-Finance:** We had our finance meeting tonight. Our next meeting will be the 23<sup>rd</sup> with reporting to the Council by the 19<sup>th</sup>.

Law Director-Climer: There was a question raised at the last meeting whether the Juneteenth holiday was continuing per ordinance. It is and it's also incorporated in the employee handbook. There was also a question raised at the last meeting whether our solicitor's ordinances require solicitors to carry their permit with them. It does not specifically say that they have to carry it with them, but they are required to show it upon request by any law enforcement officer or resident. Finally, the opioid litigation settlement is beginning to show signs of taking effect. We have a report that indicates we will likely be receiving \$22,000 after this year. Those are restricted in what they can be used for, and I have sent copies of that to the finance director, the interim fire chief and the police chief so they can identify things that money can be used for and I am happy to consult with them in that regard. Gaither: Capital gains? Climer: I read it once. The uses are fairly vague but I'm sure there are things that we do and need that can be applied. Davis: The question on the solicitors. Now, the Mayor talked about passing out something or the football players.... Mayor: We will have a letter accompanying them. Davis: So, if they do have that plaque, does that mean they cannot go on that property? Climer: Correct. That is built into the ordinance.

Mayor: The infrastructure projects that are in progress. First, is Solon Road and this is from the Bedford Heights border to Richmond Road. By the way, there is an LED light on Richmond and Solon Road that is not allowing trucks. As soon as the project is done on Forbes and Richmond, there will be a sign there. The bid opening is on the 28th, construction will begin by mid-September and will be over in 2 weeks. On Fair Oaks, the bid opening is on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, that will start early September and be completed by early November. The lights will not be on the east side of the bridge until mid 2023 because of parts. On the SE Mar (sp) project, the bid opening is mid-August and that's the county roads in OV where there will be spot repair on Richmond, Forbes, Broadway, Tryon, Alexander, Macedonia. It's a 50/50 program so the county putting up \$75,000 and we're putting up \$75,000. Tryon Road-we made an application and this is from County Executive Budish to me, 'The county have several infrastructure programs that focus on being proactive and addressing the needs of the regional transportation system while partnering with municipalities and other partners to maximize the use of our resources. One of these programs is the county 50/50 program. We have received your request for funding for the resurfacing of Tryon Road Phase II from Jean Drive to Richmond Road as the municipally sponsored project. We are excited to partner with OV on this project as part of the county's '23/'24 50/50 program. The county is willing to contribute up to 50% up to a maximum of \$235,000 towards this project.' Again, that will be in '24. At the same time we will be applying in '23 for Broadway to Jean Drive as well as a walking trail along that same path. As most of us know when you are taking Tryon Road particularly in the early evening particularly towards Broadway can be very dangerous. Unless you're alert, it's very easy to hit somebody who is walking on Tryon Road. So that is the case which then brings up where are we with Forbes. This will be from the I-271 bridge to Richmond Road. We are hoping that with the money that is to be approved, the bid opening will be in October in '23. If there is a shortfall of money and we have to apply for some other grants, it will be in '24. With Broadway from Tryon to Richmond Road, it's in '24 but again if there is a shortfall of money because of the costs of natural gas, asphalt or concrete, then it will be in '25. Interstate McBee project going on in Oak Leaf, they hope to begin operations by the middle of August of next year. They are moving right along so that is exciting. They expect to begin operations. They are moving their entire corporate campus from Cleveland. They were looking at Miami and Houston. The building will be initially 200,000 sq. ft. which will be the biggest in OV at that time. They will be adding 100,000 sq. ft. in a year and a half. In 3 years, they will be bringing in their light manufacturing facilities that are still in Cleveland in about 4-5 year. Hardin: How many jobs? Mayor: They are starting with 167 jobs. The payroll to being with is \$6 million and that brings \$150,000 a year to OV. However, Cleveland has an arrangement that if you are taking somebody from Cleveland, which we will debate although we planned it in the legislation, they were going elsewhere. Why should we be hit with 50% for the first 5 years when they could have left the county? We planned for it that's why they were only given a 10-year CRA rather than 15. They didn't understand TIFs because TIFs will cover us with the other 5 years to make it whole. It's really a classy operation. The owner's mother still does finance work for the company. She's 91 and her husband is 96 and he is still the interim CEO. Lastly, Mr. Bugarsic, I was supposed to meet with him today. He called in. I will plan to meet with him tomorrow or the worst-case Thursday, and he will be given a citation immediately. But it will be ripped up in 45 days if he gets the chickens out of

there. We are not going to wait for him to get cited. Davis: Bugarsic, you said he was going to be cited this Thursday. Will you let me know? Mayor: It will be done. Not only are their chickens but he has seagulls over there. (Davis asked about the Interstate McBee funds that was previously stated above.)

### Public Comments:

Resident 1: James Murphy 26417 Buckthorn Road We went to vote and found out we were in another district. So, the people we thought we were going to vote for, we couldn't vote for, and we didn't know anybody on the list to vote for. What area are we, we don't know. Mayor: It won't happen again as it's the BOE. But they were notified long ago that Buckthorn was in Ward 2, so I don't know what happened. Hardin: The issue was not the ward. What happened Mr. Murphy is the State of Ohio, and I am going to use the term gerrymandering. They sliced and diced the districts. We had been in 11 for forever and a day. We had a choice of Shontel Brown and several others. So, most people were looking for certain names only to get there and find that we are now in (district) 7. The issue I had with that was I felt that the BOE, State of Ohio that dealt with all of this slicing and dicing. You will be surprised who we are now with. We are with some folks over on Lakeshore. It's unbelievable. Resident 1: That's what I found out AFTER looking at it. I knew one person but the others I had no clue. I read the paper, but I am so familiar with the area. The first time we voted, we voted for Shontel and whoever. Then the second time we are somewhere in Lakewood, and they said, 'well this time, you will be able to vote for a Judge.' Hardin: But the bad part even after we voted, it still wasn't finalized. So, this whole thing is still up in the air. The actual districts were in court at the last election, were they not? Climer: It was, as I understand it, the present district are imposed for 2 years until they have to redistrict again. Hardin: It's important now that the information you will be getting going forward is where we will be the next 2 years. Resident 1: I need a little more police in my area because most people come from Richmond Road to Buckthorn by going into Beford Heights. Mayor: Are they flying through there? Resident 1: They are not paying attention to the stop signs. They are doing whatever they want to do in the morning and in the evening when they are coming home. They just don't feel like they have to stop for the stop signs. And I want to bring something new into this. I want to know if there is any kind of way we can think about solar paneling for OV. Has anybody thought about that? Hardin: It's been a little over 2 years. The building inspector is behind you. He is who I went to when you and I first talked about it. At the time, there was no real programs that we were aware of. There are solar panels in the village (Jean Drive and Glenshire). There was no project and no program, and I would think you are right; there should be some funding because that is an energy saving mechanism. Resident 1: How about we send a flyer to the village and state about solar paneling and see who would come to the meeting and the see what the government would allow and what the perks would be in order to get it going? Mayor: When checking up on solar panels, what are we looking at as a cost (to Marinucci)? Marinucci: \$65,000-\$70,000 with assistance. Resident 1: No, it is not. Marinucci: I just approved 2 of them; it is. Resident 1: I don't know who you're doing it with, but it doesn't. There are ways of getting things without paying \$65,000 to \$70,000. Gaither: He is saying that is what the homeowners paid for theirs. Hardin: What he is saying is there any energy saving grants, Mr. Mayor, that we can take advantage of? Williams: Did we just do this? Callender: We just signed an agreement with Power a Clean Future. So, they are going to be working with us. The next 10 years are going to be how to be more efficient. Something like solar panels and like will be in the works once we get up and running with this program. Myself and our Clerk are in contact with the people in this organization. We will reach out to them to see if there are immediate programs, and we will let you know.

### AN ORDINANCE ACCEPTING OPIOID SETTLEMENT FUNDS AND DIRECTING PLACEMENT OF SUCH FUNDS IN A SEPARATE FUND, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the Village has been notified by the Ohio Attorney General that the first payment of funds from the OneOhio Settlement with the opioid distributors McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., and AmerisourceBergen Corporation is being distributed to eligible local governments including the Village of Oakwood; and

WHEREAS, the State Auditor has recommended that the Village accept the Settlement Funds from the OneOhio Subdivision Settlement with McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc. and AmerisourceBergen Corporation ("Settlement Funds") subject to the adoption of an Ordinance that the local government's share of the Ohio Settlement Funds be placed in a separate fund and be used only for the approved purposes as required by OneOhio MOU.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Council of the Village of Oakwood, County of Cuyahoga, and State of Ohio:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. The Village of Oakwood hereby agrees to accept the OneOhio Opioid Settlement Funds pursuant to the OneOhio MOU and that such Settlement Funds be placed in a separate fund called the OneOhio Opioid Settlement Fund and used only for the approved purposes required by the OneOhio MOU.

SECTION 2. Prior to expending any of the Settlement Funds in the OneOhio Opioid Settlement Fund the Village official requesting use of such Settlement Funds shall provide a written explanation how the expenditure meets the approved purposes definition of the OneOhio MOU, Village Council approval shall first be obtained, and that each expenditure be tracked, and adequate documentation of the expenditure be maintained by the Finance Director of the Village of Oakwood.

SECTION 3. That actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this legislation were adopted in lawful meetings of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Chapter 114 of the Codified Ordinances of the Village of Oakwood.

Ohio reached an \$808 million agreement with the three largest distributors of opioids. The state developed the OneOhio plan, a mechanism to ensure that any money from a negotiated settlement is distributed fairly to the communities hit hardest by the opioid crisis.

The settlement agreement allocates 30% to local governments (LG Share), 55% to a foundation that will distribute funds to projects, and 15% to the Office of the Ohio Attorney General as Counsel for the State of Ohio. This bulletin will focus on the allocation of settlement proceeds provided directly to local governments in the LG Share.

The purpose of this bulletin is to emphasize the separate accountability and accounting guidance for the LG Share of the OneOhio Opioid Settlement Funds (OneOhio Funds).

### Approved Uses of the Local Government Share

OneOhio Funds must be utilized in a manner consistent with the "Approved Purposes" definition in the OneOhio memorandum of understanding (MOU). According to the MOU, the Funds must be used for "evidence-based forward-looking strategies, programming and services used to (i) expand the availability of treatment for individuals affected by substance use disorders, (ii) develop, promote and provide evidence-based substance use prevention strategies, (iii) provide substance use avoidance and awareness education, (iv) decrease the oversupply of licit and illicit opioids, and (v) support recovery from addiction services performed by qualified and appropriately licensed providers[.]"

Additionally, Exhibit A of the MOU sets forth agreed Ohio Opioid Abatement Strategies.

The Ohio Opioid Abatement Strategy includes three main components:

- Strategies for Community Recovery: Included but not limited to prevention, treatment, recovery support and community recovery projects (examples include child welfare, law enforcement strategies and other infrastructure supports). These strategies have a hyper-local focus that allows communities to collaborate and expand necessary services to their community.
- 2. Strategies for Statewide Innovation & Recovery: Included but not limited to strategies included in Community Recovery Component but also projects that promote statewide change and regional development for prevention, treatment, recovery supports and community recovery (examples include regional treatment hubs, drug task forces, data collection and dissemination). This component also includes research and development to understand how to better serve individuals and families in Ohio.
- 3. Strategies for Sustainability: Ohio's addiction and mental health epidemic was not created overnight, and it will not go away immediately. By collaborating to share resources and knowledge, Ohio's state and local communities can build a sustainable financing strategy and infrastructure to reverse the damage that has been done and prevent future epidemics and crises.

The LG Share of the OneOhio Funds can also be used for past expenditures that are consistent with the approved purposes definition.

### **Accounting for the Local Government Share**

Ohio Rev. Code §5705.09(F) requires subdivisions to establish separate funds for each class of revenue derived from a source other than the general property tax, which the law requires to be used for a particular purpose. Additionally, Ohio Rev. Code §5705.10(I) states that money paid into a fund must be used only for the purposes for which such fund is established.

Before the local government receives its portion from the state, the Auditor of State (AOS) recommends that each participating subdivision accepting the Funds provide by a written ordinance or resolution that the LG Share of the OneOhio Funds shall be placed in a separate fund and used only for the approved purposes as required by the OneOhio MOU. As the special fund is created under Ohio Rev. Code § 5705.09(F), local governments do not need to seek AOS approval for establishing this new fund.

AOS recommends that each participating subdivision accepting OneOhio Funds clearly document their rationale for each expenditure. This documentation is best provided by legislation adopted by the entity's legislative body explaining how the expenditure meets the approved purposes definition of the OneOhio MOU. To aid in our future audit work, we also ask that each expenditure be carefully tracked and adequate documentation of the expenditure be maintained.

For any expenditures previously made by a local government that are eligible for reimbursement with moneys from the LG Share, the local government must pass an ordinance or resolution that identifies

the prior expenditures and explains its determination that expenditures are for approved purposes consistent with the OneOhio MOU.

If local governments are using OneOhio Opioid Settlement dollars to reimburse expenditures from another fund, local governments have two options:

Reallocation method - Local governments should receipt the OneOhio Opioid Settlement dollars into the special revenue fund. If the original expenditure was made in the same fiscal year, the local government can reallocate the original expenditure from the original fund to the special revenue fund. Local governments should maintain documentation to support the reallocation. Local governments on the Uniform Accounting Network (UAN) system should refer to UAN for information on how to properly handle reallocations of expenditures in the UAN system. For guidance UAN provided to users to reallocate/reimburse receipts and expenditures using Coronavirus Relief Fund awards, click <a href="here">here</a>. Similar steps will apply to OneOhio Opioid Settlement dollars.

Invoice method - Local governments should receipt the OneOhio Opioid Settlement dollars into the special revenue fund. Management should prepare a detailed invoice documenting the fund that reported the original expenditure of allowable cost(s) (Original Fund), charge the invoice to the OneOhio Opioid Settlement Fund, and record a reduction of the appropriate expenditure if the reimbursement is within the same fiscal year as the original expenditure. Miscellaneous revenue may be a better choice if the reimbursement relates to a prior fiscal year. Some judgment may be needed to determine the best presentation of these amounts in each particular circumstance. Local governments should charge the appropriate functions/objects within the OneOhio Opioid Settlement Fund based on the billing received from the Original Fund. This method is most useful when the original expenditures were made in one year and receipt of the OneOhio Opioid dollars money didn't occur until the following year.

The AOS encourages recipients of OneOhio Funds to consult with their legal counsel as they plan to utilize the Funds.

### EXHIBIT 1

### OneOhio Summary of Proposed Settlement with AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal Health and McKesson

A settlement proposal is being presented to you for your consideration concerning the opioid litigation with AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal Health and McKesson (the Distributors). The settlement is being offered by the Distributors for resolution of governmental entity claims in the State of Ohio. The proposal utilizes the structure of the OneOhio agreement between the State of Ohio and its subdivisions, subject to one modification discussed below

Under the proposal, the Distributors will pay up to an estimated \$804,865,429 to the State of Ohio and its subdivisions over 18 years. Under the OneOhio agreement, these funds will be distributed according to the following allocation: 15% directly to the State of Ohio; 30% directly to subdivisions; and 55% to the OneOhio Foundation (to be utilized for the benefit of the subdivisions across the State of Ohio). Most of the money will be restricted in use and specifically earmarked for abatement of the Opioid Epidemic. Developed in consultation with the nation's leading public health experts, the list of pre-approved uses includes a wide range of intervention, treatment, education, and recovery services so that the state and its subdivisions can decide what will serve their communities.

Participation levels (the percentage of Ohio cities and counties who agree to the deal) will affect how much money the State of Ohio and its subdivisions will receive. About 45% of abatement funds are in the form of "incentive payments" which provide incentives for higher levels of participation. With the goal of getting funds to the community as fast as possible, if 95% participation is reached, abatement funds will begin flowing to the State of Ohio and its subdivisions as early as this year. Portions of the annual payment to each state may be subject to "suspension" (i.e., placed in escrow) in the event primary subdivisions bring or expand litigation against the distributors past specified suspension deadlines.

Because 45% of the funds are paid in the form of incentive payments, in order for the State of Ohio and its subdivisions to maximize recovery under the proposed settlement, it is critical that participation meets or exceeds 95%. The following is a summary of the base payment and incentive structure:

- Once a state agrees to participate, it is eligible to receive 55% of the funds as a "base payment."
- The remaining 45% can be obtained through a combination of "incentive payments."
- "Incentive A" is up to 40% of the remaining funds. Incentive A is paid if the State of Ohio enacts legislation to release all pending claims and prohibit subdivisions who have not brought claims from bringing them in the future. To allow time for the State to enact legislation, Incentive A will be paid in the first two payments, regardless of whether the legislation has been passed. Any overpayment in year one and two will offset future

payment. If Incentive A is not achieved, the State of Ohio can obtain the same amount of funds through Incentives B and C. Incentives B and C are alternatives to Incentive A.

- "Incentive B" is up to 25% off the remaining funds. Incentive B is paid on a sliding scale depending on the population of Litigating Subdivisions that are Participating Subdivisions compared to total population of all Litigating Subdivisions in the State. Must have at least 85% to get any share of Incentive B.
- "Incentive C" is up to 15% of the remaining funds. Incentive C is paid on a sliding scale depending on the population of Litigating Subdivisions and of Non Litigating Subdivisions that have a population over 30,000 that are Participating Subdivisions compared to the total population of all Litigating Subdivisions and of all Non Litigating Subdivisions with a population over 30,000 in the state. Must have at least 60% to get any share of Incentive C.
- "Incentive D" is 5% of the remaining funds. Incentive D is paid at the end of 5 years if the State of Ohio has had no later Litigating Subdivisions bring suit and proceed past preliminary motions in the prior 5 years.

To reach an agreement with the Distributors, our short-term goal is to have 95% of Litigating Subdivisions participate. If the 95% threshold is achieved, the floor for Ohio recovery is 70% of the estimated \$804,865,429.

Regardless of the participation level, Distributors will make the first two years' payments at 95% of the estimated \$804,865,429, with adjustments occurring in year 3 and beyond.

During the two period, our goal is to either achieve Incentive A or Incentives B & C, for a continued 95% payout.

The settlement is only open to governmental entities. Claims brought on behalf of private individuals and businesses (including third-party payers like health and welfare funds and insurers) are not included (and are not released), although individuals, businesses and payers will benefit from the Opioid Remediation funding and injunctive relief provided in the settlements.

In an effort to reduce attorney fees for the subdivisions and potentially increase recovery to the Foundation, attorneys for the subdivisions have agreed to amend OneOhio such that any attorney fees paid by the Distributors for contingency contracts and funding of the Local Government Fee Fund ("LGFF") from OneOhio will be used to satisfy contingency contracts. Previously OneOhio called for 60% of the LGFF to be utilized for common benefit assessment in the national litigation. By utilizing 100% the LGFF for the contingency fees, there becomes a greater likelihood that the LGFF will have a surplus, which, would revert to the Foundation for the benefit of all subdivisions. Any attorney or law firm receiving fees through this settlement would have their contingency fees capped at no more than a 25% and be required to waive enforcement against their client of any amounts owed in excess of fees recovered through the LGFF.

In addition to money to be used for abatement of the effects of the Opioid epidemic, the settlement provides robust injunctive relief that will require the Distributors make significant changes in the way they conduct their business. Among other changes, the Distributors must follow substantially increased and improved measures to identify suspicious orders and pharmacy customers, under the oversight of an independent third-party monitor. The Distributors each must begin using a clearinghouse that accounts not only for their own opioid shipments, but the shipments of the other distributors. This enables, for the first time, a truer picture of overall opioids distribution and requires drug distributors to alter their shipments based on the shipments by others. This clearinghouse will use the Distributors' collective data to establish pharmacy-specific opioid shipment limits that each Distributor must follow.

Finally, we ask that you review "Allocations to Ohio Municipalities" (Exhibit 5) to understand the amount of money your subdivision would receive as their direct 30% share through this proposal. Attorneys fees have already been deducted in Exhibit 5. You will note that there are two numbers listed as direct payment allocations. The lower number is the amount your subdivision is estimated to recover if we reach the short-term threshold of 95% of Litigating Subdivisions participating. This will result in a 70% payout. The higher number represents the amount your subdivision is estimated to recover if we meet Incentive A or the 100% participation level. You will also note two numbers under the heading "Foundation Regional Total" at both 70% and 100% allocation payouts. These numbers represent the total allocation to your region.

The following is an example of Region 2 at 100% allocation:



### **National Opioid Settlement**

### Frequently Asked Questions about the National Opioid Settlement [Subject to ongoing corrections and updates]

### 1. Which Entities Are Eligible to Participate?

These settlements are open only to states and subdivisions. Claims brought on behalf of private individuals and businesses (including private hospitals and private third-party payers) are not included (and will not be released).

All states may participate in the J&J settlement and all states except West Virginia may participate in the Distributors settlement.[1] Washington DC and the five U.S. Territories[2] are treated as states in the settlements. Within a settling state, political subdivisions may participate, including all county, municipal, and township governments and any other subdivision that has filed a lawsuit that falls within the release provisions of the agreements. "Special Districts" such as school districts, fire districts, and hospital districts also may participate (with certain limitations).[3] Subdivisions and Special Districts in non-settling states cannot participate in the settlements.[4] Subdivisions and Special Districts that separately resolved their claims with the Distributors or J&J prior to the Reference Date (explained below) also cannot participate.

Each settling state, subdivision, or Special District must provide a release to participate. (The settlements also incentivize states to obtain legislative or judicial bars on subdivisions and Special Districts suing on claims otherwise encompassed in the settlement. Even if a settling state has obtained a bar, however, a subdivision must provide a release of its own to participate and be eligible for designated subdivision settlement funds.)

### 2. What Funds Will Be Available for Abatement?

About \$23.5 billion of the maximum \$26 billion would be available to be paid out in settlement proceeds for abatement, if there is full participation in the settlement. About \$760 million of that is set aside as a credit towards potential settlements with the Tribes and certain subdivisions, leaving a "net abatement" settlement fund of about \$22.8 billion. Each of the Distributors will make annual

payments consisting of base and incentive payments (described below). Each of the Distributors and J&J will make annual payments consisting of base and incentive payments (described below).[5] Approximately half of settlement funds are earmarked for base payments. The remaining funds are earmarked for incentive payments determined on a state-by-state basis depending on whether certain benchmarks are met.[6]

### 3. How Will Settlement Proceeds Be Used?

The parties intend that the "net abatement" settlement proceeds shall be used for opioid remediation, and have agreed that at least 85% of the "net abatement" proceeds shall be used for opioid remediation.[7] At least 70% of the funds are to be used to fund future opioid-remediation efforts. The agreement includes a broad and non-exhaustive list of qualifying opioid remediation expenditures.[8]

### 4. What Is the Process to Opt In and What Are the Deadlines to Do So?

There are three phases before either settlement becomes effective. And there are opportunities to walk away if there is not enough "critical mass" to make settlement worth continuing. The settlements are designed to incentivize higher participation rates.

<u>Phase 1, State Participation</u>: Each state will have 30 days to decide whether to participate in the settlements. The Distributors and J&J then each have up to 14 days to decide whether, in their view, there is enough "critical mass" to proceed to the next phase of the respective settlements.

<u>Phase 2, Subdivision Participation</u>: In phase 2, the subdivisions in each settling state will have 120 days to decide whether to participate in the settlements (the "Initial Participation Date"). The Distributors and J&J each then have 30 days to again decide whether there is enough "critical mass" to proceed with the respective settlements (the "Reference Date").

<u>Phase 3, Consent Judgments and Effective Date</u>: The Effective Date for the settlements is 60 days after the Reference Date. During that time, each settling state will seek entry of a consent judgment to implement releases and injunctive relief. No settlement funds will be disbursed to a settling state unless a consent judgment has been entered.

<u>Later Participation</u>: States may join the settlements after the Initial Participation Date only with the consent of the Distributors/J&J. Subdivisions of settling states may sign on and participate after the Initial Participation Date ("Later Participating Subdivisions"), but may receive lower total payments than those that join earlier. If a state joins after the 30-day state cutoff, the subdivisions in that state

will be given 90 days from the date the state joins.

#### 5. How Will Settlement Funds Be Allocated Within a State?

Settlement proceeds will be allocated among three subfunds for each settling State: a State Fund, an Abatement Accounts Fund, and a Subdivision Fund. There are several important points to observe with respect to three subfunds:

- The settlement agreements provide default allocations among the subfunds (15% to the State Fund, 70% to the Abatement Accounts Fund, and 15% to the Subdivision Fund). These defaults can be changed state-by-state through a qualifying agreement between a state and its subdivisions, or by a qualifying statute or statutory trust.[9]
- Under the default, at least 50% of the annual spend from the Abatement Accounts Fund must be allocated at a <u>regional</u> Each settling state will have an Advisory Committee—with equal representation from the state and local levels—to recommend how to spend the Abatement Accounts Fund.[10]
- Certain participating subdivisions also will be eligible to receive block grants from the Abatement Accounts Fund.
- A settling state also is free to direct all or a portion of its State Fund to its Abatement Accounts
  Fund. A settling subdivision also may choose to direct all or a portion of its Subdivision Fund to the
  State's Abatement Accounts Fund or to another settling subdivision.

#### 6. How Much Will a Settling State Receive in Base Payments?

Approximately \$12.1 billion in abatement funds would be available for base payments to settling states. These base payments do not require a settling state to meet any specific participation benchmarks or conditions. Base payments will be paid out annually for distribution to each settling state according to its share of the abatement funds using the top-level state allocation model discussed below. Each state's base payment is then allocated into the three sub-funds or according to a state-subdivision agreement, as explained below.

#### 7. How Much Can a State Receive in Incentive Payments?

Approximately \$10.6 billion in abatement funds would be earmarked for "Incentive Payments" designed to reward states for increasing participation in the settlements by their subdivisions and/or taking steps to bar or otherwise resolve current and future subdivision litigation. States can qualify for four different Incentive Payments: Incentive Payments A-D. In years 1 and 2, each settling state will receive Incentive Payment A automatically and no other Incentive Payment. While the Incentive

Payments under the Distributors' agreement and J&J's agreement are similar, there are differences in how they operate and when they accrue.

# 8. <u>How Will Payments Be Calculated? How Will Payments Be Allocated Among the Settling States and Subdivisions?</u>

If the proposed settlements become effective, each of the Distributors and J&J would make annual payments consisting of base and incentive payments (described above). (J&J also will make an "initial payment" of base and incentive payments.). Calculation of the amounts distributed to each settling state (including the state and its settling subdivisions) starts with a top level allocation among all states of the maximum potential payment. How much of that maximum amount each state will receive in any given year is then based on (a) which Incentive Payment categories that state qualifies for that year; and (b) whether amounts otherwise payable are suspended due to litigation by non-settling subdivisions within a settling state and whether any offsets are taken against amounts otherwise payable, based on judgments in favor of non-settling subdivisions. Once the annual payment for a state is calculated, the further allocation of that state's payment among that state's Abatement, State, and Subdivision Funds proceeds as outlined above.

#### 9. How Will the State-Level Allocations Be Made?

For purposes of the top level maximum potential allocation discussed above, an Overall Allocation Percentage has been calculated for each state. The Overall Allocation Percentage is a blend (85%/15%) of sub-percentages calculated at both the state and subdivision levels.

The sub-percentages for each state are based principally on population. The sub-percentages for each subdivision were calculated based on each subdivision's proportionate share of the nationwide impact of the Opioid epidemic using reliable, detailed, and objective national data, including (1) the amount of opioids shipped to the state; (2) the number of opioid-related deaths that occurred in the state; and (3) the number of people who suffer opioid use disorder in the state. Adjustments were made to reflect the severity of impact because the oversupply of opioids had more deleterious effects in some locales than in others. Ultimately, the model allocates settlement funds in proportion to where the opioid crisis has caused harm.

#### 10. How Do "Tiers" Affect Payments?

There would be four possible Tiers applicable to the agreements; the more states and subdivisions that participate, the higher the Tier. The Tiers impact the extent to which payments can be suspended or offset due to litigation.

Under the Distributors' agreement, and subject to certain exceptions, the Tiers would determine (a) the circumstances and periods under which litigation by Later Litigating Subdivisions will trigger a suspension of a portion of a state's annual payment, (b) the per capita rate used to calculate the suspension amounts, (c) the annual per state cap on suspension amounts, and (d) the annual per state cap on offsets for certain monetary judgments in favor of non-settling subdivisions.

Under J&J's agreement, the Tiers would affect the circumstances under which litigation by non-settling subdivisions will trigger a suspension of a portion of a state's base and incentive payments.

# 11. <u>Can Settlement Payments Be Suspended? Can a Defendant Take an Offset Against a Settlement Payment?</u>

Yes, if the settlements become effective, portions of a settling state's payments could be held in suspension and/or offset under specified circumstances concerning litigation by its subdivisions.

A central goal of the proposed settlements is to shift the focus from litigation to getting Opioid abatement funds to states and subdivisions. With that goal in mind, portions of the payments to each state may be subject to "suspension" (i.e., placed in escrow) in the event certain subdivisions bring or expand litigation against the Distributors or J&J after the Reference Date, if the litigation continues past specified suspension deadlines. The suspension deadlines are determined by the applicable participation Tier (the higher the Tier, the less onerous the suspension deadline). Dollar-for-dollar "offsets" also may be taken if certain subdivisions obtain judgments that require payments by the Distributors or J&J.

#### • Will There Be a Grace Period During Which Payments Will Not Be Subject to Suspension?

Yes. Under the Distributors' agreement, suspensions will not be applicable to <u>any</u> settling state's annual payments during the first two payment years and, in payment years 3-18, suspensions are not applicable to the annual payment of any state that is eligible for Incentive Payment A (see above) in that year. Other exceptions would apply, including claims for less than \$10 million and (when Tier 1 applies) claims by subdivisions of fewer than 10,000 people.

Under J&J's agreement, the suspension will not affect base payments in years 1-7. The suspension would affect only Incentive Payments A-D in any year and base payments in the last two payment years.

#### 12. Will the Settlements Require Any Change to How the Defendants Operate Their Businesses?

In addition to billions of dollars to be used for abatement of the effects of the Opioid epidemic in communities across the nation, the proposed settlements would provide robust injunctive relief that will require the Distributors and J&J to make significant changes in the way they conduct their business in order to address the Opioid epidemic on the <u>supply</u> side as well. Among other changes, the Distributors must follow substantially increased and improved measures to identify suspicious orders and pharmacy customers, under the oversight of an independent third-party monitor. The Distributors each would be required to begin using a clearinghouse that accounts not only for their own opioid shipments, but the shipments of the other distributors. This enables, for the first time, a truer picture of overall opioids distribution and requires drug distributors to alter their shipments based on the shipments by others. This clearinghouse will use the Distributors' collective data to establish pharmacy-specific opioid shipment limits that each Distributor must follow.

As for J&J, which no longer markets or sells Opioids, the company and its subsidiaries (including Janssen) would agree not to reintroduce any Opioids for a 10-year period. This prohibition would extend to the manufacture, sale, promotion, and distribution of any opioid products as well as any lobbying relating to prescription opioids. J&J has also would agree to make the clinical trial data for its discontinued opioid products available for medical research via the Yale University Open Data Access Project.

#### 13. How Will Attorneys' Fees and Costs Be Addressed?

The overarching goal of this global settlement is to dedicate funds to abate opioid-related harms. If private lawyers representing the states and thousands of subdivisions were to enforce their contingency fee contracts, a significant portion of the global settlement payments would go towards legal fees to compensate efforts to prosecute the lawsuits that are being resolved as to the Distributors and J&J. As a result, the government entities that hired counsel to litigate against the Distributors and J&J would net less proportional recovery than entities that did not litigate, even though it was this active state and subdivision litigation that led to this historic settlement. To guard against this imbalance and maximize the amounts available for abatement, the negotiating State Attorneys General, the PEC's Negotiation Team, and the settling defendants have proposed to agree that these defendants will pay, and the parties will set aside, separate funds totaling a maximum of \$1.95 billion to pay private counsel attorneys' fees.

These funds would include \$350 million for outside counsel representing participating states and about \$1.6 billion for outside counsel representing participating subdivisions. The \$350 million state fund would be allocated by agreement between the states and their outside counsel.

#### 14. How will more information on the settlements be made available?

Settlement documents, information, and updates will be posted on a public settlement website, https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/. The website will provide current information on an ongoing basis as the settlement implementation progresses.

- [1] West Virginia previously settled with the Distributors in an unrelated settlement. A portion of the Distributors' settlement funds is treated as a credit toward potential settlements with West Virginia subdivisions and with Tribes. For J&J's agreement, a portion of the settlement funds is treated as a credit for Oklahoma, non-settling government entities and the Tribes. Settlement payments by the Distributors and J&J are calculated as net after those credits.
- [2] American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and U.S. Virgin Islands.
- [3] Special Districts are treated as subdivisions under the Distributor agreement. The J&J agreement defines Special Districts separately from subdivisions, but still allows them to participate in the settlement by signing release forms.
- [4] There is one exception in the J&J settlement agreement: subdivisions of the State of Oklahoma, whose litigated claims against J&J are the subject of an appeal pending in the Oklahoma Supreme Court, are eligible to participate in the J&J settlement whether or not the State elects to participate.
- [5] J&J's base and incentive payments are front-loaded, with about 80% coming in the first three years and the rest over the next six years. The Distributors' payments are spread over 18 years.
- [6] In the Distributors' agreement, 55% of the payments are earmarked as base payments. In the J&J agreement, 45% of the payments are earmarked as base payments.
- [7] If settlement proceeds are used for something other than Opioid Remediation, the amounts and uses (including any use to pay attorneys' fees and costs) must be publicly reported.
- [8] If settlement proceeds are used for something other than Opioid Remediation, the amounts and uses (including any use to pay attorneys' fees and costs) must be publicly reported.
- [9] Allocation agreements/statutes have already been reached or enacted in several states.
- [10] Spending from the Abatement Allocation Account Fund will be tracked and reported annually.

# CASE MANAGEMENT ORDER APPLICABLE TO CASES OF "NON-PARTICIPATING SUBDIVISIONS" ASSERTING CLAIMS AGAINST SETTLING DEFENDANTS

Defendants McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., AmerisourceBergen Corporation, and Johnson & Johnson<sup>1</sup> (collectively, "Settling Defendants") have announced global settlements with "Participating Subdivisions," subject to sign-on periods and final approvals by the Parties. The Court now enters this Case Management Order ("CMO") making clear it will lift *in part* the stay issued by this Court in its April 11, 2018 Case Management Order One (docket no. 232). As set forth below, the stay will no longer apply to the extent that, beginning in approximately six months, each Non-Participating Subdivision that is litigating a case in the MDL shall be required to comply with this CMO. The stay shall remain in effect with respect to all other

litigation activity (including discovery) until authorized by a subsequent CMO to be issued at an appropriate time after full compliance with this CMO.

This CMO applies to MDL cases already filed by any Non-Participating Subdivision, and also to cases brought by a Non-Participating Subdivision that are newly filed in, removed to, or transferred to the MDL after the entry of this CMO (collectively, "NPS Cases"). In all such NPS Cases, the Court orders as follows.

The parties' global settlements were announced on July 21, 2021, and they contain various contingencies such that a final determination of which entities are Participating Subdivisions and which are Non-Participating Subdivisions will not become final until approximately February 1, 2022 (the "Determination Date"). Accordingly, this CMO becomes effective in each MDL case filed by a Non-Participating Subdivision on the later of these two dates: (a) the Determination Date; or (b) the date thirty (30) days after the Non-Participating Subdivision's case is filed in, removed to, or transferred to the MDL, if such date is after the Determination Date (collectively, the "CMO Effective Date").

- I. Every Non-Participating Subdivision shall comply with all requirements of this Court's June 19, 2018 Fact Sheet Implementation Order (docket no. 638), including the production of documents and information required by the Plaintiff Fact Sheet. In addition, to the extent necessary to make all information in a Fact Sheet current, every Non-Participating Subdivision shall complete, execute and serve an *updated* Plaintiff Fact Sheet within sixty (60) calendar days of the CMO Effective Date, including production of additional documents as necessary.
- II. Within ninety (90) calendar days of the CMO Effective Date:
- (A) Each Non-Participating Subdivision shall serve on Settling Defendants a document identifying with specificity, based on facts known or reasonably available to it at the time, the

following: (1) the nature and amount of all damages or other relief sought, including alleged abatement or civil penalties; (2) a computation of any monetary relief sought, including alleged abatement, and the basis for the amounts included in that computation; (3) as to claims for past expenditures, whether the alleged amounts were paid or reimbursed through a grant, insurance, or other third-party source; and (4) as to any claim involving future expenditure of money, including expenditures for the provision of services, the entities that will make the expenditures, when and how long those entities will make the expenditures, and the nature and amount of the expenditures, including how they will address any and all alleged harms.

- (B) Each Non-Participating Subdivision seeking any form of relief based directly or indirectly upon opioid orders that Non-Participating Subdivisions contend the Settling Defendants should not have shipped, pursuant to a suspicious order regulation or alleged common law duty related to suspicious orders, shall serve on Settling Defendants a document identifying: (1) those opioid orders that are within their current knowledge (including the date of the order, the product(s) ordered, and the quantity ordered); (2) the distributor, pharmacy, other dispensing entity, or other entity that placed each such order; and (3) the Non-Participating Subdivision's basis for identifying the orders, including any sources relied upon and algorithms used.
- (C) Each Non-Participating Subdivision shall additionally produce all non-privileged documents relied upon in identifying or calculating the claimed relief.
- (D) Any Non-Participating Subdivision that intends to proffer one or more expert opinions to identify or substantiate the relief sought shall identify its experts and provide a detailed summary of each expected report, including all pertinent calculations and identification of sources relied upon.
- III. Within one hundred twenty (120) calendar days of the CMO Effective Date:

- (A) Each Non-Participating Subdivision shall complete and serve an affidavit signed by the Non-Participating Subdivision and its counsel attesting that the Non-Participating Subdivision has complied with all requirements of the MDL Court's Fact Sheet Implementation Order and with all other requirements of this CMO, including the requirements for production of documents.
- IV. If a Non-Participating Subdivision has not timely completed and served the affidavit described above, any Settling Defendant may send the Non-Participating Subdivision a deficiency letter. If, after thirty (30) calendar days of the date a deficiency letter was sent, the Non-Participating Subdivision has not cured the relevant defects in compliance with the MDL Court's Fact Sheet Implementation Order and this CMO, any Settling Defendant may request a show cause hearing before the MDL Court as to why the Non-Participating Subdivision's claims should not be dismissed with prejudice or any other appropriate relief should be granted.
- V. Nothing in this CMO prohibits, or suspends the obligation of, timely supplementation or amendment of any information supplied based on subsequently-obtained knowledge or factual information that the Non-Participating Subdivision did not have access to and could not reasonably have obtained for inclusion in the required disclosures. This opportunity to supplement does not relieve each Non-Participating Subdivision of its responsibility to comply with this CMO fully and completely on the basis of information within its possession or that reasonably can be obtained at the time it is first required to comply.
- VI. Because the goal of the multidistrict litigation statute is to avoid needless duplication of effort and expense, nothing in this CMO prevents reasonable access by each Non-Participating Subdivision to the work product of the PEC. Case-specific discovery obligations for the production of data and information, consistent with those imposed by the Court on the parties in

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all of its prior discovery Orders of general application, will apply to all NPS cases. All parties in

NPS cases must familiarize themselves with all prior MDL discovery orders of general application.

After discovery in NPS cases is authorized by a subsequent CMO, the parties shall conduct

discovery as appropriate under the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. Nothing in this Order relieves

any party of its prior or ongoing discovery and production obligations under other Orders of this

Court.

The governmental entity identified above ("Governmental Entity"), in order to obtain and in consideration for the benefits provided to the Governmental Entity consistent with the material terms of the National Settlement Agreement dated July 21, 2021 ("National Distributor Settlement"), and acting through the undersigned authorized official, hereby elects to participate in the material terms of the National Settlement Agreement Distributor Settlement, release all Released Claims against all Released Entities, and agrees as follows.

- 1. The Governmental Entity is aware of and has reviewed the National Distributor Settlement, understands that all terms in this Participation Form have the meanings defined therein, and agrees that by signing this Participation Form, the Governmental Entity elects to participate consistent with the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement and become a Participating Subdivision as provided therein pursuant to the terms of the final OneOhio Memorandum of Understanding dated July 28, 2021.
- 2. The Governmental Entity's election to participate is specifically conditioned on participation by 95% or more of the Litigating Subdivisions in Ohio. Should less than 95% of the Litigating Subdivisions in Ohio participate, this election shall be deemed void and no claims shall be released.
- 3. The Governmental Entity shall, prior to the filing of the Consent Judgment, secure the dismissal with prejudice of any Released Claims that it has filed.
- 4. The Governmental Entity agrees to the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement pertaining to Subdivisions as defined therein.
- 5. By agreeing to the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement and becoming a Releasor, the Governmental Entity is entitled to the benefits provided therein, including, if applicable, monetary payments beginning after the Effective Date.
- 6. The Governmental Entity agrees to use any monies it receives through the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement solely for the purposes provided therein.

- 7. The Governmental Entity submits to the jurisdiction of the Madison County Court of Common Please where the Consent Judgment is filed for purposes limited to the court's role as provided in, and for resolving disputes to the extent provided in, the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement Agreement. If the National Distributor Settlement is finalized, the Governmental Entity likewise agrees to arbitrate before the National Arbitration Panel as provided in, and for resolving disputes to the extent otherwise provided in the National Distributor Settlement.
- 8. The Governmental Entity has the right to enforce the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement as provided therein.
- 9. The Governmental Entity, as a Participating Subdivision, hereby becomes a Releasor for all purposes in the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement, including, but not limited to, all provisions of Part XI, and along with all departments, agencies, divisions, boards, commissions, districts, instrumentalities of any kind and attorneys, and any person in their official capacity elected or appointed to serve any of the foregoing and any agency, person, or other entity claiming by or through any of the foregoing, and any other entity identified in the definition of Releasor, provides for a release to the fullest extent of its authority. As a Releasor, the Governmental Entity hereby absolutely, unconditionally, and irrevocably covenants not to bring, file, or claim, or to cause, assist or permit to be brought, filed, or claimed, or to otherwise seek to establish liability for any Released Claims against any Released Entity in any forum whatsoever. The releases provided for in the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement are intended by the Parties to be broad and shall be interpreted so as to give the Released Entities the broadest possible bar against any liability relating in any way to Released Claims and extend to the full extent of the power of the Governmental Entity to release claims. The material terms of National Distributor Settlement shall be a complete bar to any Released Claim.
- 10. The Governmental Entity hereby takes on all rights and obligations of a Participating Subdivision consistent with the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement.
- 11. In connection with the releases provided for in the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement, each Governmental Entity expressly waives, releases, and forever discharges any and all provisions, rights, and benefits conferred by any law of any state or territory of the United States or other jurisdiction, or principle of common law, which is similar, comparable, or equivalent to § 1542 of the California Civil Code, which reads:

**General Release; extent.** A general release does not extend to claims that the creditor or releasing party does not know or suspect to exist in his or her favor at the time of executing the release, and that if known by

him or her would have materially affected his or her settlement with the debtor or released party.

A Releasor may hereafter discover facts other than or different from those which it knows, believes, or assumes to be true with respect to the Released Claims, but each Governmental Entity hereby expressly waives and fully, finally, and forever settles, releases and discharges, upon the Effective Date, any and all Released Claims that may exist as of such date but which Releasors do not know or suspect to exist, whether through ignorance, oversight, error, negligence or through no fault whatsoever, and which, if known, would materially affect the Governmental Entities' decision to participate in the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement.

12. Nothing herein is intended to modify in any way the terms of the material terms of the National Distributor Settlement to which Governmental Entity hereby agrees, with the exception of the requisite Litigating Government participation level. If the National Settlement becomes effective by July 1, 2022 its terms will supersede the terms of the Ohio Settlement Agreement and will control with regard to all provisions except for Dismissal of Claims as set forth in the Ohio Settlement Agreement. If it is not effective by July 1, 2022, the Ohio Specific Distributor Settlement will control. To the extent this Participation Form is interpreted differently from the Ohio Specific Distributor Settlement in any respect, the Ohio Specific Distributor Settlement controls.

I have all necessary power and authorization to execute this Participation Form on behalf of the Governmental Entity and have been afforded the opportunity to review this matter with counsel.

#### ONE OHIO MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Whereas, the people of the State of Ohio and its communities have been harmed by misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance committed by certain entities within the Pharmaceutical Supply Chain; and,

Whereas, the State of Ohio, though its Attorney General, and certain Local Governments, through their elected representatives and counsel, are separately engaged in litigation seeking to hold Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants accountable for the damage caused by their misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance; and,

Whereas, the State of Ohio, through its Governor and Attorney General, and its Local Governments share a common desire to abate and alleviate the impacts of that misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance throughout the State of Ohio;

Now therefore, the State and its Local Governments, subject to completing formal documents effectuating the Parties' agreements, enter into this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") relating to the allocation and use of the proceeds of Settlements described.

#### A. Definitions

As used in this MOU:

- 1. "The State" shall mean the State of Ohio acting through its Governor and Attorney General.
- 2. "Local Government(s)" shall mean all counties, townships, cities and villages within the geographic boundaries of the State of Ohio.
- 3. "The Parties" shall mean the State of Ohio, the Local Governments and the Plaintiffs' Executive Committee of the National Prescription Opiate Multidistrict Litigation.
- 4. "Negotiating Committee" shall mean a three-member group comprising one representative for each of (1) the State; (2) the Plaintiffs' Executive Committee of the National Prescription Opiate Multidistrict Litigation ("PEC"); and (3) Ohio Local Governments (collectively, "Members"). The State shall be represented by the Ohio Attorney General or his designee. The PEC shall be represented by attorney Joe Rice or his designee. Ohio Local Governments shall be represented by attorney Frank Gallucci, or attorney Russell Budd or their designee.
- 5. "Settlement" shall mean the negotiated resolution of legal or equitable claims against a Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant when that resolution has been jointly entered into by the State, PEC and the Local Governments.

- 6. "Opioid Funds" shall mean monetary amounts obtained through a Settlement as defined in this Memorandum of Understanding.
- 7. "Approved Purpose(s)" shall mean evidence-based forward-looking strategies, programming and services used to (i) expand the availability of treatment for individuals affected by substance use disorders, (ii) develop, promote and provide evidence-based substance use prevention strategies, (iii) provide substance use avoidance and awareness education, (iv) decrease the oversupply of licit and illicit opioids, and (v) support recovery from addiction services performed by qualified and appropriately licensed providers, as is further set forth in the agreed Opioid Abatement Strategies attached as Exhibit A. For purposes of the Local Government Share, "Approved Purpose(s)" will also include past expenditures.
- 8. "Pharmaceutical Supply Chain" shall mean the process and channels through which Controlled Substances are manufactured, marketed, promoted, distributed or dispensed.
- 9. "Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant" shall mean any entity that engages in or has engaged in the manufacture, marketing, promotion, distribution or dispensing of an opioid analgesic.

#### **B.** Allocation of Settlement Proceeds

- 1. All Opioid Funds shall be divided with 30% going to Local Governments ("LG Share"), 55% to the Foundation (structure described below) ("Foundation Share"), and 15% to the Office of the Ohio Attorney General as Counsel for the State of Ohio ("State Share").
- 2. All Opioid Funds, regardless of allocation, shall be utilized in a manner consistent with the Approved Purposes definition. The LG Share may also be used for past expenditures so long as the expenditures were made for purposes consistent with the remaining provisions of the Approved Purposes definition. Prior to using any portion of the LG Share as restitution for past expenditures, a Local Government shall pass a resolution or take equivalent governmental action that explains its determination that its prior expenditures for Approved Purposes are greater than or equal to the amount of the LG Share that the Local Government seeks to use for restitution.
- 3. The division of Opioid Funds paid to Local Governments participating in an individual settlement shall be based on the allocation created and agreed to by the Local Governments which assigns each Local Government a percentage share of Opioid Funds. The allocations are set forth in Exhibit B. With respect to Opioid Funds, the allocation shall be static.
- 4. In the event a Local Government merges, dissolves, or ceases to exist, the allocation percentage for that Local Government shall be redistributed equitably based on the

composition of the successor Local Government. If a Local Government for any reason is excluded from a specific settlement, the allocation percentage for that Local Government shall be redistributed equitably among the participating Local Governments.

- 5. If the LG Share is less than \$500, then that amount will instead be distributed to the county in which the Local Government lies to allow practical application of the abatement remedy.
- 6. Funds obtained from parties unrelated to the Litigation, via grant, bequest, gift or the like, separate and distinct from the Litigation, may be directed to the Foundation and disbursed as set forth below.
- 7. The LG Share shall be paid in cash and directly to Local Governments under a settlement or judgment, or through an administrator designated in the settlement documents who shall hold the funds in trust in a segregated account to benefit the Local Governments to be promptly distributed as set forth herein.
- 8. Nothing in this MOU should alter or change any Local Government's rights to pursue its own claim. Rather, the intent of this MOU is to join all parties to seek and negotiate binding settlement or settlements with one or more defendants for all parties within Ohio.
- 9. Opioid Funds directed to the Foundation shall be used to benefit the local community consistent with the by-laws of the Foundation documents and disbursed as set forth below.
- 10. The State of Ohio and the Local Governments understand and acknowledge that additional steps should be undertaken to assist the Foundation in its mission, at a predictable level of funding, regardless of external factors.
- 11. The Parties will take the necessary steps to ensure there is the ability of a direct right of action under the expedited docket rules to the Ohio Supreme Court relative to any alleged abuse of discretion by the Foundation.

#### C. Payment of Counsel and Litigation Expenses

- 1. The Parties agree to establish a Local Government Fee Fund ("LGFF") to compensate counsel for Local Governments if the Parties cannot secure the separate payment of fees and associated litigation expenses for their counsel from a settling entity.
- 2. The LGFF shall be calculated by taking 11.05% of the total monetary component of any settlement accepted ("LGFF Amount"). Fees related to product or other items of value shall be addressed case by case.

- 3. The first 45% of the LGFF amount shall be drawn from the LG Share. The remaining 55% shall be drawn from the Foundation Share. No portion of the LGFF Amount may be assessed against or drawn from the State Share.
- 4. To the extent the Parties can secure the separate payment of fees and associated litigation expenses from a settling entity, the amount to be drawn for the LGFF will be proportionally reduced.
- 5. This LGFF Amount will be deposited into the LGFF and shall be utilized for purposes of satisfying Local Government contingent fee contracts. In the absence of a National Prescription Opiate MDL settlement with any defendant settling through this One Ohio Memorandum of Understanding, the LGFF may be subject to a common benefit assessment. In the event of a common benefit assessment, the assessment shall be paid from the LGFF and in no instance shall an assessment cause the LGFF to be more than 11.05% of the total monetary component of any settlement accepted. In no instance shall any assessment be collected from the State Share, Foundation Share or Local Government Share.
- 6. Local Government contingent fee contracts shall be capped at 25% or the actual contract rate whichever is less. Eligible contingent fee contracts shall be executed as of March 6, 2020 and subject to review by the committee designated to oversee the Local Government Fee Fund.
- 7. Common Benefit awards will be coordinated as set forth in the M.D.L. Common Benefit Fee Order. Expenses will be addressed consistent with the manner utilized in the M.D.L.
- 8. Any balance left in the LGFF following the payment of fees shall revert to the Foundation.
- 9. Any attorney fees related to representation of the State of Ohio shall not be paid from the LGFF but paid directly from the State Share or through other sources.

#### D. The Foundation

- 1. The State of Ohio will be divided into 19 Regions (See attached Exhibit C). Eight of the regions will be single or two county metropolitan regions. Eleven of the regions will be multi-county, non-metropolitan regions.
- 2. Each Region shall create their own governance structure so it ensures all Local Governments have input and equitable representation regarding regional decisions including representation on the board and selection of projects to be funded from the region's Regional Share. The Expert Panel (defined below) may consult with and may make recommendations to Regions on projects to be funded. Regions shall have the responsibility to make decisions that will allocate funds to projects that will equitably serve the needs of the entire Region.

3. The Parties shall create a private 501(c)(3) foundation ("Foundation") with a governing board ("Board"), a panel of experts ("Expert Panel"), and such other regional entities as may be necessary for the purpose of receiving and disbursing Opioid Funds and other purposes as set forth both herein and in the documents establishing the Foundation. The Foundation will allow Local Governments to take advantage of economies of scale and will partner with the State of Ohio to increase revenue streams.

#### 4. Board Composition

- a. The Board will consist of 29 members comprising representation from four classes:
  - Six members selected by the State (five selected by the Governor and one selected by the Attorney General);
  - Four members drawn from the Legislature
    - One representative selected by the President of the Ohio Senate;
    - One representative selected by the Ohio Senate Minority Leader;
    - One representative selected by the Speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives; and,
    - One representative selected by the Ohio House Minority Leader
  - Eleven members with one member selected from each non-metropolitan Regions; and
  - Eight members, with one member selected from each metropolitan Regions.
- b. All board members shall serve as fiduciaries of the Foundation as required by Ohio Revised Code § 1702.30(B) governing directors of nonprofit corporations.
- 5. Board terms will be staggered. Five members, (one from each of the first three classes above, and two from the metropolitan class) will be appointed for an initial three-year term, eight members of the Board (two from the first class, including the Attorney General's representative, one from the second class, four from the third class, and one from the fourth class) will be appointed for an initial term of one

- year. The remaining members will be appointed for a two-year term. Board members may be reappointed. All subsequent terms will be for two years.
- 6. Eighteen members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. Members of the Board may participate in meetings by telephone or video conference or may select a designee to attend and vote if the Board member is unavailable to attend a board meeting.
- 7. In all votes of the Board, a measure shall pass if a quorum is present, the measure receives the affirmative votes from a majority of those board members voting, and at least one member from each of the four classes of Board members votes in the affirmative.
- 8. The Foundation shall have an Executive Director appointed by the Governor.
  - a. The Governor shall appoint the Executive Director at his or her discretion from a list of three candidates provided to the Governor by the Board. If the Governor finds all three candidates to be unsatisfactory, the Governor may reject all three candidates and request the Board to provide three new persons to select from.
  - b. In choosing candidates to be submitted to the Governor, the Board shall seek candidates with at least six (6) years of experience in addiction, mental health and/or public health and who shall have management experience in those fields.
  - c. No funds derived from the Foundation Share shall be used to pay the Executive Director or any of the foundation staff in excess of the maximum range (range 42) of the Department of Administrative Services Exempt Schedule E2 or that schedule's successor.
  - d. The Executive Director shall serve as an ex officio, non-voting member of both the Board and the Expert Panel.
- 9. The Board shall appoint the Expert Panel. The Expert Panel shall consist of six members submitted by the Board Members representing the Local Governments, two members submitted by the Governor and one member submitted by the Attorney General. Expert Panel members may be members of Local Governments or the State. The Expert Panel will utilize experts in addiction, pain management, public health and other opioid related fields to make recommendations that will seek to ensure that all 19 regions can address the opioid epidemic both locally and statewide. Expert Panel members may also be members of the Foundation Board, but need not be.
- 10. The Foundation Board and the Regions shall be guided by the recognition that expenditures should ensure both the efficient and effective abatement of the opioid

epidemic and the prevention of future addiction and substance misuse. In recognition of these core principles, the Board and the Regions shall endeavor to assure there are funds disbursed each year to support evidence-based substance abuse/misuse prevention efforts.

#### 11. Disbursement of Foundation Funds by the Board

- a. The Foundation Board shall develop and approve procedures for the disbursement of Opioid Funds of the Foundation consistent with this Memorandum of Understanding.
- b. Funds for statewide programs, innovation, research, and education may also be expended by the Foundation. Any statewide programs funded from the Foundation Share would be only as directed by an affirmative vote of the Board as set forth in paragraph D(7) above. Expenditures for these purposes may also be funded by the Foundation with funds received from either the State Share (as directed by the State) or from sources other than Opioid Funds as provided in paragraph 14 below.
- c. Funds approved for disbursement to the nineteen Regions shall be allocated based on each Region's share of Opioid Funds ("Regional Share"). Each Regional Share shall be calculated by summing the individual percentage shares of the Local Governments within that Region as set forth in Exhibit B. The Regional Shares for each Region are set forth in Exhibit D.
- d. Regions may collaborate with other Regions to submit joint proposals to be paid for from the Regional Shares of two or more Regions for the use of those Regions.
- e. The Foundation's procedures shall set forth the role of the Expert Panel and the Board in advising, determining, and/or approving disbursements of Opioid Funds for Approved Purposes by either the Board or the Regions. Proposed disbursements to Regions of Regional Shares shall be reviewed only to determine whether the proposed disbursement meets the criteria for Approved Purposes.
- f. Within 90 days of the first receipt of any Opioid Funds and annually thereafter, the Board, assisted by its investment advisors and Expert Panel, shall determine the amount and timing of Foundation funds to be distributed as Regional Shares. In making this determination, the Board shall consider: (a) Pending requests for Opioid Funds from Regions; (b) the total Opioid Funds available; (c) the timing of anticipated receipts of future Opioid Funds; (d) non-Opioid Funds received by the Foundation; and (e) investment income. The Foundation may disburse its principal and interest with the aim towards an efficient, expeditious abatement of the Opioid crisis considering long term and short term strategies.

- g. Votes of the Board on the disbursement and expenditure of funds shall, as with all board votes, be subject to the voting procedures in Section D(7) above. The proposed procedures should provide for the Board to hear appeals by Local Governments from any denials of requested use of funds.
- 12. The Foundation, Expert Panel, and any other entities under the supervision of the Foundation shall operate in a transparent manner. Meetings shall be open, and documents shall be public to the same extent they would be if the Foundation was a public entity. All operations of the Foundation and all Foundation supervised entities shall be subject to audit. The bylaws of the Foundation Board regarding governance of the Board as adopted by the Board, may clarify any other provisions in this MOU except this subsection. This substantive portion of this subsection shall be restated in the bylaws.
- 13. The Foundation shall consult with a professional investment advisor to adopt a Foundation investment policy that will seek to assure that the Foundation's investments are appropriate, prudent, and consistent with best practices for investments of public funds. The investment policy shall be be designed to meet the Foundation's long and short-term goals.
- 14. The Foundation and any Foundation supervised entity may receive funds including stocks, bonds, real property and cash in addition to the proceeds of the Litigation. These additional funds shall be subject only to the limitations, if any, contained in the individual award, grant, donation, gift, bequest or deposit consistent with the mission of the foundation.

#### E. Settlement Negotiations

- 1. All Members of the Negotiating Committee, and their respective representatives, shall be notified of and provided the opportunity to participate in all negotiations relating to any Ohio-specific Settlement with a Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant.
- 2. No Settlement Proposal can be accepted for presentation to Local Governments or the State under this MOU over the objection of any of the three Members of the Negotiating Committee. The Chair shall poll the Committee Members at the conclusion of discussions of any potential settlement proposal to determine whether such objections exist. Although multiple individuals may be present on a Member's behalf, for polling purposes each Member is a single entity with a single voice.
- 3. Any Settlement Proposal accepted by the Negotiating Committee shall be subject to approval by Local Governments and the State.
- 4. As this is an "All Ohio" effort, the Committee shall be Chaired by the Attorney General. However, no one member of the Negotiating Committee is authorized to

- speak publicly on behalf of the Negotiating Committee without consent from the other Committee Members.
- 5. The State of Ohio, the PEC or the Local Governments may withdraw from coordinated Settlement discussions detailed in this Section upon 5 days' written notice to the remaining Committee Members and counsel for any affected Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant. The withdrawal of any Member releases the remaining Committee Members from the restrictions and obligations in this Section.
- 6. The obligations in this Section shall not affect any Party's right to proceed with trial or, within 30 days of the date upon which a trial involving that Party's claims against a specific Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant is scheduled to begin, reach a case specific resolution with that particular Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant.

#### Acknowledgment of Agreement

We the undersigned have participated in the drafting of the above Memorandum of Understanding including consideration based on comments solicited from Local Governments. This document has been collaboratively drafted to maintain all individual claims while allowing the State and Local Governments to cooperate in exploring all possible means of resolution. Nothing in this agreement binds any party to a specific outcome. Any resolution under this document will require acceptance by the State of Ohio and the Local Governments.

We the undersigned ACCEPT / REJECT (Circle One) the One Ohio Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU"). We understand that the purpose of this MOU is to permit collaboration between the State of Ohio and Local Governments to explore and potentially effectuating earlier resolution of the Opioid Litigation against Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants. We also understand that an additional purpose is to create an effective means of distributing any potential settlement funds obtained under this MOU between the State of Ohio and Local Governments in a manner and means that would promote an effective and meaningful use of the funds in abating the opioid epidemic throughout Ohio.

#### OHIO ABATEMENT STRATEGIES

#### **Opioid-Related Definition:**

Funds from any settlement dollars should be used to prevent, treat and support recovery from addiction including opioids and/or any other co-occurring substance use and/or mental health conditions which are all long-lasting (chronic) diseases that can cause major health, social, and economic problems at the individual, family and/or community level.

#### **Ohio Abatement Strategy Overview**

Similar to and including many national settlement strategies, to abate addiction in Ohio, we have created an abatement plan that includes three main components that will work collaboratively to address Ohio's needs and also serve as a complement to and should be integrated with all other state and local government plans:

- Strategies for Community Recovery: Included but not limited to prevention, treatment, recovery support and community recovery projects (examples include child welfare, law enforcement strategies and other infrastructure supports). These strategies have a hyper-local focus that allows communities to collaborate and expand necessary services to their community.
- 2. Strategies for Statewide Innovation & Recovery: Included but are not limited to strategies included in Community Recovery Component but also projects that promote statewide change and regional development for prevention, treatment, recovery supports and community recovery (examples include regional treatment hubs, drug tasks forces, data collection and dissemination). This component also includes research and development to understand how to better serve individuals and families in Ohio.
- 3. Strategies for Sustainability: Ohio's addiction and mental health epidemic was not created overnight, and it will not go away immediately. By collaborating to share resources and knowledge, Ohio's state and local communities can a build sustainable financing strategy and infrastructure to reverse the damage that has been done and prevent future epidemics and crises.

#### **PART ONE: Community Recovery**

#### **Treatment**

Expanding availability of treatment, including Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT), for OUD and any co-occurring substance use or mental health condition.

Trauma-informed treatment services and support for individuals, their children and family members who have experienced trauma during their lives including trauma as a result of addiction in the family.

Expand access and support infrastructure developments for telemedicine / telehealth services to increase access to OUD treatment, including MAT, as well as counseling, psychiatric support, and other treatment and recovery support services.

Improve oversight and quality assurance of Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) to assure evidence-informed practices such as adequate methadone dosing.

Engage non-profits and faith community to uncover and leverage current community faithbased prevention, treatment and recovery support in partnership with medical and social service sectors.

Expand culturally appropriate services and programs that address health disparities in treatment for persons with mental health and substance use disorders, including for programs for vulnerable populations (i.e. homeless, youth in foster care, etc.); citizens of racial, ethnic, geographic and socio-economic differences, and new Americans to ensure that all Ohioans have access and treatment and recovery support services that meet their needs.

Development of National Treatment Availability Clearinghouse – Fund development of a multistate/nationally accessible database whereby healthcare providers can list locations for currently available in-patient and out-patient OUD treatment services that are both timely and accessible to all persons who seek treatment.

Ensure that each patient's needs and treatment recommendations are determined by a qualified clinical professional. Offer training and practice support to clinicians on the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) levels of care (or other models) and the most effective methods of treatment continuation between levels of care for people with addiction including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions and make all levels of care available to all Ohioans.

#### Early Intervention and Crisis Support

Fund the expansion, training and integration of Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) and Screening, Treatment Initiation and Referral (STIR) programs and ensure that healthcare providers are screening for addiction and other risk factors and know how to appropriately counsel and treat (or refer if necessary) a patient for mental health and substance use disorders.

Support work of Emergency Medical Systems, including peer support specialists, to effectively connect individuals to treatment or other appropriate services following an opioid overdose or other opioid-related adverse event.

Create an intake and call center to facilitate education and access to treatment, prevention and recovery services for persons with addiction including opioids and any co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions.

Create a plan to meet the distinct needs of families of children and youths who experience severe emotional disorders and provide respite and support for these caregivers to reduce family crisis and promote treatment.

Create community-based intervention services for families, youth, and adolescents at-risk for addiction including opioids and any co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions.

Create school-based contacts who parents can engage with to seek immediate treatment services for their child.

Develop best practices on addressing individuals with addiction in the workplace, including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions.

Implement and support assistance programs for healthcare providers with OUD and any cooccurring substance use disorders or mental health (SUD/MH) conditions.

#### Address the Needs of Criminal-Justice Involved Persons

Address the needs of persons involved in the criminal justice system who have opioid use disorder (OUD) and any co-occurring substance use disorders or mental health (SUD/MH) conditions.

Support pre-arrest diversion and deflection strategies for persons with addiction including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions, including established strategies such as sequential intercept mapping and other active outreach strategies such as the Drug Abuse Response Team (DART) or Quick Response Team (QRT) models or other co-responder models that engage people not actively engaged in treatment.

Support pre-trial services that connect individuals with addiction including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions to evidence-informed treatment, including MAT, and related services.

Support treatment and recovery courts for persons with addiction including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions, but only if these problemsolving courts provide referrals to evidence-informed treatment, including MAT.

Provide evidence-informed treatment, including MAT, evidence-based psychotherapies, recovery support, harm reduction, or other appropriate services to individuals with addiction

including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions who are incarcerated, on probation, or on parole.

Provide evidence-informed treatment, including MAT, evidence-based psychotherapies, recovery support, harm reduction, or other appropriate re-entry services to individuals with addiction including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions who are leaving jail or prison or who have recently left jail or prison.

Support critical time interventions (CTI), particularly for individuals living with dual-diagnosis substance use disorder/serious mental illness, and services for individuals who face immediate risks and service needs and risks upon release from correctional settings.

#### Mother-Centered Treatment and Support

Finance and promote evidence-informed treatment, including MAT, recovery, and prevention services for pregnant women, post-partum mothers, as well as those who could become pregnant and have addiction including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions.

Training for obstetricians and other healthcare personnel who work with pregnant women or post-partum women and their families regarding treatment for addiction including opioids and any other co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions.

Invest in measures to address Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome, including prevention, care for addiction and education programs.

Fund child and family supports for parenting women with addiction including opioids and any co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions.

Enhanced family supports and childcare services for parents receiving treatment for addiction including opioids and any co-occurring substance use or mental health conditions.

#### Recovery Support

Identify and support successful recovery models including but not limited to: college recovery programs, peer support agencies, recovery high schools, sober events and community programs, etc.

Provide technical assistance to increase the quantity and capacity of high-quality programs that model and support successful recovery.

Training and development of procedures for government staff to appropriately interact and provide social and other services to current and recovering opioid users. To reduce stigma and to normalize a culture of recovery, government staff will be provided with onboarding and training that generates a cultural shift and provides all government employees with tool and resources to feel supported and to support colleagues who may be struggling with substance use disorder.

Convene community conversations and trainings that engage non-profits, civic clubs, the faith-based community, and other stakeholders in training and techniques for providing referrals and supports to those persons to family and friends struggling with substance use disorder.

Identify and address transportation barriers to permit consistent participation in treatment and recovery support.

Support the development of recovery-friendly environments in all sectors, schools, communities and workplaces to promote and sustain health and wellness goals. Put resources toward:

- 1. Supportive and recovery housing;
- 2. Supportive employment/jobs;
- 3. Certification of peer coaches, peer-run recovery organizations, recovery community organizations;
- 4. Crisis intervention and relapse prevention; and
- 5. Services and structures that support young people living a life in recovery including, recovery high schools and collegiate recovery communities.

#### Prevention

Invest in school-based programs that have demonstrated effectiveness in preventing drug misuse and that appear promising to prevent the uptake and use of opioids. Investment in school and community-based prevention efforts and curriculum that has demonstrated effectiveness in reducing Adverse Childhood Events (ACEs) and their impact by increasing resiliency, and preventing risk-taking, unhealthy or dangerous behaviors such as: drug use, misuse, early alcohol use, and suicide attempts.

Assist coalitions and community stakeholders in aligning state, federal, and local resources to maximize procurement of school and community education curricula, programs and campaigns for students, families, school employees, school athletic programs, parent-teacher and student associations, aging and elderly community members and others in an effort to build a comprehensive prevention and education response that addresses prevention across the lifespan.

Invest in environmental scans and school surveys to identify effective prevention efforts and realign prevention and treatment responses with those emerging risk factors and changing patterns of substance misuse.

Fund community anti-drug coalitions that engage in drug prevention efforts and education.

<u>Prevent Over-Prescribing of Opioids and Other Drugs of Potential Misuse</u>

Training for healthcare providers regarding safe and responsible opioid prescribing, dosing, and tapering patients off opioids.

Continuing Medical Education (CME) on prescribing of opioids and other drugs of concern.

Support for non-opioid pain treatment alternatives, including training providers to offer or refer patients to multi-modal, evidence-informed treatment of pain.

Development and implementation of a National Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) – Fund development of a multistate/national PDMP that permits information sharing while providing appropriate safeguards on sharing of private health information, including but not limited to: a. Integration of PDMP data with electronic health records, overdose episodes, and decision support tools for healthcare providers relating to opioid use disorder (OUD) and other drugs of concern.

#### Prevent Overdose Deaths and Other Harms (Harm Reduction)

Increase availability and distribution of naloxone and other drugs that treat overdoses for use by first responders, persons who have experienced an overdose event, patients who are currently prescribed opioids, families, schools, community-based service providers, social workers, and other members of the general public.

Promote and expand naloxone strategies, which work to ensure that individuals who have received naloxone to reverse the effects of an overdose are then engaged and retained in evidence-based treatment programs.

Provide training and education regarding naloxone and other drugs that treat overdoses for first responders, persons who have experienced an overdose event, patients who are currently prescribed opioids, families, schools, and other members of the general public.

Develop data tracking software and applications for overdoses/naloxone revivals.

Invest in evidence-based and promising comprehensive harm reduction services and centers, including mobile units, to include; syringe services, supplies, naloxone, staffing, space, peer-support services, and access to medical and behavioral health referrals.

Expand access to testing and treatment for infectious diseases such as HIV and Hepatitis C resulting from intravenous opioid use.

#### Services for Children

Review the continuum of services available to Ohio's youths, young adults, and families to identify gaps and to ensure timely access to appropriate care for Ohio's youngest citizens and their parents.

Fund additional positions and services, including supportive housing and other residential services to serve children living apart from custodial parents and/or placed in foster care due to custodial opioid use.

Expand collaboration among organizations meeting the prevention, treatment, and recovery needs of Ohio's young people and organizations serving youths, such as Boys & Girls Clubs, YMCAs and others. Support the growth of recovery high schools, collegiate recovery communities, and alternative peer groups for youths recovering from mental illness and substance use disorders.

## <u>First Responders (EMS, Firefighters, Law Enforcement and other criminal justice professionals)</u>

Provide funds for first responders and criminal justice professionals and participating subdivisions for cross agency/department collaboration and other public safety expenditures relating to the opioid epidemic that address both community and statewide supply and demand reduction strategies including criminal interdiction efforts.

Training public safety officials and responders safe-handling practices and precautions when dealing with fentanyl or other drugs.

Provide trauma-informed resiliency training and support that address compassion fatigue and increased suicide risk of public safety responders.

#### Workforce

Fellowships for addiction medicine specialists for direct patient care, instructors, and clinical research for treatments.

Scholarships/loan forgiveness for persons to become certified addiction counselors, licensed alcohol and drug counselors, licensed clinical social workers, and licensed mental health counselors practicing in the SUD/MH field, and scholarships for certified addiction counselors, licensed alcohol and drug counselors, licensed clinical social workers, and licensed mental health counselors practicing in the SUD/MH field for continuing educations licensing fees.

Funding for clinicians to obtain training and a waiver under the federal Drug Addiction Treatment Act to prescribe MAT for opioid use disorders.

Training for healthcare providers, students, and other supporting professionals, such as peer recovery coaches/recovery outreach specialists to support treatment and harm reduction.

Dissemination of accredited web-based training curricula, such as the American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry's Provider Clinical Support Service-Opioids web-based training curriculum and motivational interviewing.

### PART TWO: Statewide Innovation & Recovery

#### Leadership, Planning and Coordination

Provide resources to fund the oversight, management, and evaluation of abatement programs and inform future approaches.

Community regional planning to identify goals for opioid reduction and support efforts or to identify areas and populations with the greatest needs for prevention, treatment, and/or services.

A government dashboard to track key opioid/and addiction-related indicators and supports as identified through collaborative community processes.

Provide funding for grant writing to assist already established community coalitions in securing state and federal grant dollars for capacity building and sustainability.

#### Stigma Reduction, Training and Education

Commission statewide campaigns to address stigma against people with mental illness and substance use disorders. Stigma and misinformation deeply embed the deadly consequences of Ohio's public health crisis. These prevent families from seeking help, fuel harmful misperceptions and stereotypes in Ohio communities, and can discourage medical professionals from providing evidence-informed consultation and care. Ohio's campaign to end stigma should include chronic disease education; evidence-based prevention, treatment, and harm reduction strategies; stories of recovery; and a constant reframing of mental illness and addiction from a personal moral failing to a treatable chronic illness.

Coordinate public and professional training opportunities that expand the understanding and awareness of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and psychological trauma, effective treatment models, and the use of medications that aid in the acute care and chronic disease management of both mental illness and addiction.

Strengthen the citizen workforce by providing community-based trainings, such as Mental Health First Aid, Crisis Intervention Training, naloxone administration, and suicide prevention. These best practice trainings should be allowable as Continuing Education Units for professional development and when offered in an educational setting, provide academic credit.

Development and dissemination of new accredited curricula, such as the American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry's Provider Clinical Support Service Medication-Assisted Treatment.

Training for emergency room personnel treating opioid overdose patients on post-discharge planning. Such training includes community referrals for MAT, recovery case management and/or support services.

Public education relating to drug disposal.

Drug take-back disposal or destruction programs.

Public education relating to emergency responses to overdoses.

Public education relating to immunity and Good Samaritan laws.

Educating first responders regarding the existence and operation of immunity and Good Samaritan laws.

#### OneOhio Exhibit A

Invest in public health education campaigns that inform audiences about the ease of contraction of hepatitis C, and that engage persons at-risk to receive testing and treatment.

Convene and host community conversations and events that engage local non-profits, civic clubs, and the faith-based community as a system to support prevention.

Fund programs and services regarding staff training, networking, and practice to improve staff capability to abate the opioid crisis.

Support infrastructure and staffing for collaborative cross-systems coordination to prevent opioid misuse, prevent overdoses, and treat those with addiction including opioids and/or any other co-occurring substance use and/or mental health conditions (e.g. behavioral health prevention, treatment, and recovery services providers, healthcare, primary care, pharmacies, PDMPs).

Support community-wide stigma reduction regarding accessing treatment and support for persons with substance use disorders.

#### RESEARCH

Ensuring that funding is flexible to invest in short and long-term research and innovation projects that embrace new advances, technology and other strategies that meet the needs of Ohioans today and in the future.


