WHEREAS, the Village of Oakwood, Cuyahoga County, herein referred to as the "Political Subdivision" hereby submits this written agreement to participate in the Ohio Department of Transportation's (ODOT) annual road salt bid in accordance with Ohio Revised Code 5513.01(B) and hereby agrees to all the following terms and conditions in its participation of the ODOT road salt contract.

- A. The Political Subdivision hereby agrees to be bound by all terms and conditions established by ODOT in the road salt contract, and acknowledges that upon award of the contract by Director of ODOT, it shall be bound by all such terms and conditions included in the contract; and
- B. The Political Subdivision hereby acknowledges that upon the Director of ODOT's signing of the road salt contract, it shall effectively form a contract between the awarded salt supplier and the Political Subdivision; and
- C. The Political Subdivision agrees to be solely responsible for resolving all claims or disputes arising out of its participation in the ODOT road salt contract and agrees to hold the Department of Transportation harmless for claims, actions, expenses, or other damages arising out of the Political Subdivision's participation in the road salt contract; and

Departmental Reports

Fire-Tapp: We have a new reporting system if you want a copy of that let me know. Hardin asked for a copy.

Building-Hardin expressed her thanks for work on Somerville. Marinucci explained an instance in which he had a phone conversation with an LLC regarding compliance, and he was called a racist. Climer mentioned he must use regular mail and make notes.

Service-Haba: Trash will be picked up on Presidents Day. Hardin mentioned Somerville. Haba: We cold patched areas. Davis asked what the policy is for folks who leave garbage cans out for weeks on Hickory. Haba: I will stop there again and leave a letter. Gottschaik: We put out a letter each spring regarding garbage cans. Warren: They should receive a citation. Hardin mentioned garbage cans cannot be in the front of the house.

Law-Climer: No report

Police-Garratt: I just sent out a press release regarding Hyundai and Kia 2012-20120 models and offering 'the Club' free to Oakwood residents. Davis: Why these vehicles. Garratt: They are the easiest to steal.

Mayor: We interviewed the CEO of Thermo Fisher Scientific. Their stock was \$1,000 in 2005 and is now valued at \$20,000. Also, the Vet Center is open for veterans. He showed an 8-minute video on the 'Electric Disco Band'. The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame personnel will be here, hopefully, but if we can't get them, we will get Hotel California. View Ray sold an MRI guided radiation therapy unit to UH Seidman Cancer Center. We have three companies in Oakwood which are in cancer research and are all expanding here. High tech and medical research personnel must come to work so in Oakwood we have a lot of people working. The County has gone through six Sheriffs. Davis asked about Kroger. Mayor:

Their Chief Technical Officer had personal family issues. We are now meeting with him. **Matlock** spoke about Bedford schools. **Mayor**: We are providing technical education to our students. We focus on what will be in demand in the next 5-10 years. Many of our students have excelled due to our summer programs. Council and Mayor discussed.

Open Floor

Karen Howse 7209 Glenshire: We have young people with families. I have always asked when you plan your concerts, what audience are you trying to attract? I am not criticizing. I feel like generation-x is often missed. Mayor: How many cities are doing concerts? I have done this for 25-years. This is what is successful. Howse: Jazz is popular as well. Mayor: What brings in the money are these types of concerts to the 501C3. I don't get much from Oakwood Village. On Fridays, we will have local entertainment five weeks in a row. Thursdays are the big name musicians which is a big draw. This is what works. Howse: The City of Warrensville brings in eclectic bands. We recognize we have options. Mayor: That is on Friday nights. Thursday are the national acts. These promote Oakwood. Howse: Families are attracted to a community because of the school district. She spoke about our school district, it is challenged by private schools. Public schools get a bad rap. We should bring ideas to the school board with our concerns. As legislators we should promote our district. Warren: Cleveland schools are down but its what you get out of it. Howse: I am for the trades, Why don't we have a police academy in the summer program? My son benefited by our Police Dept. I pray for our Police, Fire and Service Depts. We pass legislation but there are no attachments. Climer: When was that. Howse: The last appropriation in 2021. in December. Climer will research it. Howse: Maybe the attachment wasn't on the website. Mayor: I want to make clear; I wasn't putting down the Bedford School System, but the national level. Our new superintendent has been industrious but it is a long road. I am not being critical. Hardin asked if the village was going to offer classes. Mayor: Yes. It hasn't happened yet. Many jobs will be different in 5-10 years. We need to be creative to enable our students change on a dime to move forward. Howse asked about a consortium of Walton Hills, Bedford and Oakwood work together for this. Mayor: If this happens, it could work out nicely. Maple Heights has two new school buildings with residents leaving. We can just put together a model and present it to Bedford, then to the County and State to look into it. Matlock suggested involving each community within the Bedford district. I would love to see this happen. We have a lot of transient families in our district. Mayor: Forty percent of Bedford homes are leased. Kids coming in are behind. Warren: Homeowners stay in their homes more than renters. Howse: You need wrap around support for families. Hardin: Hummer was at the Planning meeting. Mayor: The Hummer building on Macedonia is requesting putting vans in the back. We want screening. Hardin: Several residents wanted to come tonight about Kroger but couldn't. Mayor: I have a meeting in early March. Hardin: What do we need to enforce zoning ordinances? She asked Warren to have his information available again that he put out about assistance to residents. She asked about increasing fines. Warren: We could ask the Building Dept. what their largest issues are. Climer: We studied what other cities do for difficult issues especially point of sale inspections. I am happy to speak to Dan Marinucci about that, Floor Closed

The numbers weren't in the right places. Mayor: You will have that. Warren: We can't demand our Finance Director to change numbers. We can't do that. Williams: The dollars the Federal government gave are required to be in a specific fund by themselves. Warren: As long as that is the case. Williams: I would like to see them in the correct place. If not, that has to be corrected. Howse: There could have been an executive session to review the audit. Williams: At the last meeting it hadn't been completed. I want to make sure his job is done, the year closed out, and monies are where they need to be and if the audit was completed. Mayor: You will have that before the 21st. Warren: We could have that by the next Council meeting. Williams: It will be nice to have those in time to review, not just five days to review. That is a lot of numbers.

Gaither opened meeting at 6:05p

Thompson reviewed the reports with Council. In 2022, we collected \$10,269,014 in the general fund with a beginning balance of \$72,355.74. We had \$10, 341,370 in revenue and general fund expenses of \$10,105,252, with unexpended balance \$236,117.84. Please refer to the reports attached. Hardin asked if this is the final year end. Thompson: Yes. We did not have any negative funds. The unexpended balance of \$421,091 shows the total cash of all funds at the end of 2022. Davis asked about encumbrances. Thompson explained those are carried over into the next year. Hardin asked about ambulance billing. Thompson: The ending balance is \$470.50. Hardin asked what is spent in that fund. Thompson: A lot of their expenses are for repairs to the vehicles, equipment, some of the leases and the management company who collects on the claims. Almost 60% of the budget was payroll and benefits with the pension. Not all individuals in Fire get a pension. Instead of PERS they do Medicare. We have an agreement with the City of Cleveland, which services the hydrants. Williams asked about leases. Thompson responded by explaining the 217 fund. Davis asked about dispatch. Thompson: That is a split cost. Hardin asked where we can save other than salaries? Where do we cut? Thompson: It is contingent upon what it takes to run the three villages. Predictions can have variables. Hardin asked about tax abatements regarding savings. Thompson: Council has the authority of the budget. We know payroll is a huge situation. Health Care has provided savings. I paid off \$100,000 in debt last year. Categories involve debt, staffing, large equipment, etc. Matlock asked about employee leave. Thompson: They can take two weeks or more depending on their tenure. Employees can carry over their leave balance up to two weeks into the next year. Matiock asked who oversees the leave personnel take during the year. Thompson: The Dept heads. They have to submit that to the Finance dept., and we have a sign off sheet for the dept head. Matlock asked if we have access to those sheets. Thompson: Yes. Matlock asked who authorizes it. Thompson: The dept. head manages those; it is categorized in the payroll dept. then placed into personnel files. Davis asked about sick time. Thompson: Employees get twelve days a year for sick time. Davis asked about collections from I Schuman. Thompson: They should have insurance to pay some of the employees. We were collecting \$144,000 annually. I shared a report with over 20 years of income tax collections.

2023 Budget

Thompson reviewed 2023 proposed budget. Estimated resources with ending 2022 balances is \$11,010,000. The 100% appropriations are at \$10,660,000 with projected year end at \$342,264. **Hardin** asked what can be done to maintain \$700,000 at year end? **Thompson**: Other than safety forces and health benefits, we subsidize recreation and senior programs as well as debt service. **Hardin** asked about how much we spend on the senior fund. **Thompson**: YTD \$96,316.00 and recreation fund \$222,808.00.

Special Funds

Thompson: \$7.3 million is estimated with \$7.2 expenditures. Total estimated general funds and special revenue is \$18.3 million. Expenditures is \$17.8 million. **Davis** asked about projected revenue from I Schuman. **Warren**. We will only receive 1/3 of that to date because we are only in the first quarter. **Thompson** explained the estimated resources of 2023 report (attached). **Davis** asked about tipping fees. **Thompson**: We get royalties from the Waste Management transfer station. **Davis** asked about Mayors Court. **Thompson**: This is the estimated revenue. I always use conservative numbers. **Davis** asked about fire service contract. **Thompson**: That involves Glenwillow, Oakwood, and Walton Hills. **Davis** asked about liquor permits. **Thompson**: That involves all those permits.

Audit

Thompson: No findings for recovery were given but we had five findings on the finance statement. A couple are related to me regarding the amended certificate, estimated resources, and appropriations. I did correct those for 2022. The exceeded certificate was noted. I took giant steps for that as well. One referred to negative fund balances. The statement of cash position, we did not have that. I sent an explanation. We also had the Covid funds noted with financial reporting. I didn't know the categorizations but put them in one fund. It isn't a high-level finding. I contacted them for corrections. I did create the correct fund. Warren spoke about special funds since they have limited usage. The auditors want to make sure they stand out so they can review them for compliance. Thompson: I was not cited for use, only for accountability. We closed 2022 and at the next Finance meeting, we are moving to close January and February by then. Davis asked about Building permit revenue. Thompson: The Mayor waves some but we do collect quite a bit. Davis asked about donations. Thompson: We get some from individuals. I would have to run the detail. Petitti gives us \$20,000 to water the plants. Davis asked about Security officers at community center. Thompson: We have to put the dollars in that fund. Davis asked about Glenwillow senior van. Thompson: We have legislation for that.

Williams asked if the minutes reflect what happened in the meeting. Sometimes I see comments about the conversation. Warren: It doesn't have to be verbatim. Williams: It looks like you added comments to the minutes. I suggest you make comments at the following meeting. Clerk: Ok.

Departmental Reports

Fire-Tapp: We had three fires of which one was ISchuman, we had the State Fire Marshall and Environmental Services out. The water used there was tested, but we haven't received results yet. Air quality is being tested daily. We are fortunate to have only one casualty. I want to thank many departments that showed up with five engines, five ladder trucks, and other equipment. Davis: Do you have an estimate of when we will know what caused it? Tapp explained we are working with the ATF, EPA and others. It usually takes two weeks for that report. Mayor asked if everyone got a notice regarding the incident. Clerk: There are extras available here. Hardin complimented the department. Warren commented about a plane crash with five inspectors onboard on their way to the incident, all five died. Hardin: Can we get another flyer on the final report? **Tapp**: Yes. There will be a flyer and it will be on the website. **Hardin**: When something like this happens, a call should go out to let us know. Warren: In this situation, they are overwhelmed. We held back because we needed more facts. You and the department did a phenomenal job. The building is catastrophic. Tapp: In my 28 years in Fire, this is the largest disaster I have responded to.

Police-Garratt: They did a phenomenal job. We try to get the information out as fast as we can but sometimes, we are so involved in the incident we cannot at the time. The response was well planned. It was impressive. This is our anniversary of changing the dispatch center. Tapp: Dispatchers did a phenomenal job. ISchuman wants security on site. We provide that.

Service-Haba: I am here for questions.

Building-Marinucci: There are no building code violations with them. Callender: We appreciate everyone.

Finance-Thompson: No additional reporting Law-Climer: I am here to answer questions.

Mayoral-Mayor: Our hearts go out after the tragedy at ISchuman, we pray for the ones impacted that they are in the arms of our Heavenly Father and He will meet every need they have. I was notified of concerns over the Solon/Glenwillow land fill and water run-off. Cuyahoga County Board of Health ran tests, and it showed no run-off into Tinkers Creek was seen. Regarding the construction debris landfill, a leach collection system is operated by Solon. No run-off there as well. Regarding the companies in Oakwood, View Ray gave their annual report yesterday. They design and manufacture MRI guided radiation therapy. One-unit costs over \$6 million with over 55 systems sold worldwide. UH just purchased one for their Siedman Cancer Center. He asked about permits regarding their plans. Marinucci: The plans are in place. Mayor: IBM Molecular is building a \$4 million dollar expansion. Ohio Cat, next to ISchuman, is adding \$4 million expansion. Interstate McBee plans operations to begin this fall. This is exciting in Oakwood. I will be meeting with Kroger Development Dept. I ask our Heavenly Father with the richness of His Glory that we will reflect your glory with what is happening in Oakwood. Davis: Ohio Cat is expanding the building? Mayor: Inside the building.

Open Floor Comments

Pat Malone 22796 Drake Road: Thank you Fire and Police the way you handled the explosion. It was scary for us. How many times was testing done? Tapp: Several times the water and air were tested that day. Malone: I don't have a lot of faith in the EPA. Tapp: They have been monitoring water and air. I understand. Malone: Should CodeRed had been activated? Garratt: If evacuation was warranted it would have. Malone: At the end of Drake Road there is some construction. Is there any law regarding mud on the roadway? Marinucci: I will check into it tomorrow morning. They did pull a permit. Malone: Mayor, the pillars at the corner of Macedonia and Broadway property, what is going to happen with them? **Mayor**: They will probably be placed at the entrance of Kroger. **Malone**: When is Fair Oaks being done? Mayor: It should begin the end of March and be completed 90 days thereafter. It will be closed 60 of the 90 days. Malone asked about detours. Garratt: Detour will take motorists to Route 8. Malone: I was on Council years ago. .Mayor: We are getting over \$1 million and I can assure you this project will be done by the end of July. Malone: Ok. I called Village Hall and the girl who answers the phone is a little snippy. I asked her if there is a Council meeting tonight. I was transferred to Christine's office instead of getting a simple answer. It can't be because she doesn't know, she works here. Mayor: You may have talked to Finance and the one gai may not have known. Malone: How would she not? Mayor: Why would a Finance Clerk know that answer? The snippiness will be addressed. Malone: I am not blaming you Christine at all. Warren: That person could have asked someone near them for the answer. Malone: Thank you. I will be back.

Benjamin Sizemore 25091Garden Road: I used to work at a place in Bedford Heights where metals were worked with, and we had to keep water from hitting those metals. We had a lot of solvents there too. OSHA came in to inspect. You did a phenomenal job on that fire. It shook my house. Tapp: There was a lot of fire. Sizemore: Does OSHA schedule inspections, or do they just do surprise inspections? Tapp: Surprise inspections. ISchuman hasn't had fines. We inspect annually. Sizemore: Do they give you what is transported there? Tapp: Yes. We have to be notified of all chemicals in the village shipment by train or truck. Sizemore: I respect you all. Mayor: Many years ago there was a fire at Northfield and Alexander in Walton Hills. We put water on it but there was magnesium. It actually spread the fire. Walton Hills didn't even know there was magnesium there. They should have known that, and we should have been told. Sizemore explained his knowledge of magnesium and a fire he saw at a place he worked involving that chemical. We had a lot of training on all the chemicals we worked with.

Malone: What about the sound barriers? **Mayor**: You are perpendicular to I-271, you are not parallel. There will be a big difference when you don't' have the ruts in the road. **Malone**: What happened to the evergreens on Macedonia Road on the mound. **Mayor**: They will be replaced.

Candidate for Judge (Clerk did not catch the name): I am the Acting Judge and Magistrate Bedford Municipal Court for 17 years now. Judge Melling didn't run again due to age restrictions imposed by the state of Ohio. You cannot be over70 years of age as a judge. I am a candidate on the ballot. I just wanted to introduce myself.

Residents of Oakwood Village,

As you are aware, a fire and explosion occurred on February 20, 2023, at the I. Schumann & Company facility located at 22500 Alexander Road in Oakwood. It was a large-scale fire and explosion with many injuries and one fatality. The fire was contained in about two hours with the help of more than 80 personnel from our neighboring communities which included seven Chiefs, 21 fire departments and 20 advanced life support ambulances. Additionally, five law enforcement agencies assisted the fire department with scene security. We are grateful for the support our community received from our neighbors.

Questions have arisen concerning what, if any, hazards may be posed by this event. We assure you that we are making use of every available asset to ensure all of our residents are safe. We are conducting the investigation in collaboration with the State Fire Marshall. Multiple parties from the EPA as well as Enviro-Serve are monitoring the air quality and water runoff and we are in contact with their representatives on a daily basis. The ATF (Alcohol Tobacco & Firearms) is involved in the investigation to help determine the cause of the explosion. We are working with the village engineers concerning the stability of the remaining structure.

To date, these experts have not notified us of any hazardous substances released as a result of the incident. We will endeavor to keep the community advised of any further information on the situation as it becomes available.

The cost installed is \$49,129 which is less than the \$50,000 reimbursement grant. The signs are 48" tall about 20' long. Beachwood has one at Cedar and I-271 entrance ramp. Hardin asked about it. Hren: We will pay for the fencing. I am confident by the time ODOT designs and awards it, which takes 18 months, we will have time to apply to agencies for the funding of the fences. Warren: We have the option to move forward if we wish to. Davis confirmed the size and installation. Williams asked about the grant. Hren: We were denied by ODOT, we could purchase two additional ground signs on the grant.

Special Funds

Thompson: No findings for recovery were given but we had five findings on the finance statement. A couple are related to me regarding the amended certificate, estimated resources, and appropriations. I did correct those for 2022. The exceeded certificate was noted. I took giant steps for that as well. One referred to negative fund balances. The statement of cash position, we did not have that. I sent an explanation. We also had the Covid funds noted with financial reporting. I didn't know the categorizations but put them in one fund. It isn't a high-level finding. I contacted them for corrections. I did create the correct fund. Warren spoke about special funds since they have limited usage. The auditors want to make sure they stand out so they can review them for compliance. Thompson: I was not cited for use, only for accountability. We closed 2022 and at the next Finance meeting, we are moving to close January and February by then. Davis asked about Building permit revenue. Thompson: The Mayor waves some but we do collect quite a bit. Davis asked about donations. Thompson: We get some from individuals. I would have to run the detail. Petitti gives us \$20,000 to water the plants. Davis asked about Security officers at community center. Thompson: We have to put the dollars in that fund. Davis asked about Glenwillow senior van. Thompson: We have legislation for that.

Thompson began with the analysis of I Schuman explosion and the monetary impact to the Village (see attached). We collected approximately \$15,000 for Jan. and Feb and are expecting the same for March. I spoke with the owner who stated some employees are continuing to be paid. We expect \$90,000 in collections with \$5,000 per month thereafter. A shortfall of \$50,000 will most likely occur on income tax collections. The estimated budget included a conservative 2.5% increase from last year to 2023. I did not have Interstate McBee in these assumptions but in conversations with them, we are looking at \$45,000 from them. In addition, Decom working with Spectrum, we estimate \$20,000 income tax from them. We will end up with \$7,400 net gain for the year. Williams asked about I Schuman. Thompson: They have been here over 100 years. Williams: Do we have a record of collections for 2021-2022? Mayor: All we need is 2022. Warren: We can do whatever we want, Mayor: What is the point. Warren: We want to see 2019 forward. Point of order. Anybody can ask what they want. We want to see 2019 prior to covid, 2020 during covid, 2021 to show increases in businesses and 2022. Williams: What are you estimating from. Thompson: I am estimating off prior year collections. Williams: I would like to see those numbers. Please provide 2021-2022. You don't know if your estimate is correct. Thompson: We know. We collected from Jan, Feb and March. Their staff is going to 1/3. I already gave 2021 and gave you 2022. Williams asked it to be broken down by month. Do we have actual collections for interstate McBee. No because they are new. Thompson: We know the amount of payroll coming. Williams: When will these funds be received? Thompson: Interstate McBee will be received the last quarter of 2023. Williams: We will have a shortfall the first three quarters of the year. Thompson: I Schuman loss will be \$54,000 but we will make up for it in the final quarter. Williams: You keep cutting me off. We are losing funds before the fourth quarter. Thompson: We will lose about \$60,000. Williams: When do you expect funds from Decon. Thompson: End of year. Williams: Explain the adjustment. Thompson: I adjusted it due to the I Schuman accident. Williams: If we get the \$65,000 then we will gain \$7,500 over and above. That would still be a loss because we would have gotten I Schuman along with the other two. **Thompson**: I could have made this report a little prettier, but Mayor is cutting out \$21,000 Gospel Fest from appropriations. We can adjust the appropriations to reflect that. Hardin asked about it. Thompson: Ms. Hardin and I had a discussion about ratios in the Senior and Rec budgets. Senior is 1% of general and Senior/Rec is 4%. The top \$8 million is my projected collections for 2023. Hardin began to ask a question. Davis asked about the I Schuman amount. Thompson: I gave detail regarding the loss. Warren: Worst case scenario take the \$45,000 off if we don't get a dime from them going forward. **Williams:** if you take \$15,000 (what we should be getting from I Schuman) x 12 months, that is more than \$144,000. Thompson: Yes. We expected revenue to be up this year. Williams asked him to add that to the report as to whether what we receive is actual vs estimated. Thompson: I can do that. Hardin asked about what the Mayor is cancelling in his expenditures from his budget. **Thompson**: We want to reduce the Mayor's appropriations by \$21,000. **Hardin**: We increased it by \$66,000 from last year. Thompson: Yes. Hardin: Why are you insisting on that increase? Warren: That was proposed post I Schuman. Hardin: Is there anything else we can cut. Mayor: We are already fiduciarily responsibly.

If we see we are running short, we will deal with it at that time. I am cautiously comfortable. Hardin asked what Thompson committed to in our meeting, **Thompson**: We would be in the black in 2023, **Hardin**: I asked you for monthly finance to show where we actually are, not just what was spent. Thompson: Year end 2023 I project \$332,000 increase from last year. If we cut out the \$21,000, that will bring it up to about \$350,000. Thompson: We ended last year with \$236,000 before encumbrances and \$119,000 after encumbrances. Hardin: Are you committing to \$350,00 year end? Thompson: Yes. We will open this up like a checkbook to see where we are every month. Hardin: We can always amend appropriations but that isn't the objective. Williams asked the monthly payroll. Thompson: About \$350,000 a month. Williams: We will end this year with one payroll. I don't know why we would feel comfortable with that number, We provide a lot of services but our employees provide that to our residents. We need money for them. **Thompson**: There . will have to be some hard decisions made. Warren: At the end of the year, we were agreeable on the budget. Hardin interrupted: Where is Kroger, Mayor: Kroger isn't part of this. Williams: We are not comfortable with a goal of \$350,000. Warren: As a matter of record, we all agreed with that. I suggest we delete the \$66,000 increase in Recreation and if that is received, we can allow a transfer. If the \$66,000 doesn't come in, we will not allow it. Mayor: That is fair, Warren: We will reduce Recreation by \$66,000 and Mayor's budget by \$21,000. If in fact you go over the appropriation. I will not agree to do any transfers in the Recreation line item. I further suggest we make the adjustment. We will hold a special meeting next week to pass the budget after it is amended. Thompson: Ok. Council members agreed, Matlock asked if we can put something in place where we increase the ending balance each year. Hardin: Just because the money comes in, don't spend it. Warren suggested beginning this year, we will put \$50,000 into an account and add to it each year that cannot be touched. Gaither: I asked Brian for a line item for a municipal complex. What do we have in it? The Police Dept. building is falling down back here. **Thompson**: I put preliminary dollars in that to do a study for that.

Motion to approve minutes of January 31,2023 special Council meeting made by Gaither, seconded by Callender. YES: Warren, Gaither, Callender, Hardin, Matlock, Williams Abstain: Davis Motion passed

Departmental Reports

Building-Marinucci: An LLC owner of a house accused me of being a racist and disturbed Lilly. He was cited with the help of the law director. We are getting more of these. Hardin complimented Arron in the Building Dept. for his professionalism. Marinucci: Thank you. Mayor mentioned a house on Booker that is unlivable but is for sale. Marinucci: That property is condemned. Mayor: Bedford has 45% rentals. Marinucci: We are on it. Hardin addressed a pop-up trailer in someone's yard. We have RV's with people living in them. Marinucci: We will address it. Hardin asked about garbage can placement. I need a newsletter to go out. Mayor: My newsletter is close to being done. We will address that. Hardin asked about the RVs. Marinucci will address those. Davis asked about the Bugarcic vacant house on Hickory. Someone is rehabbing the house. Marinucci: No one is there every time we visit the house. Warren asked about permits. Marinucci will check it out. Matlock asked about three houses; one regarding trash, another in disrepair, and a third is vacant. Marinucci: I will get letters out. I know what you are talking about. Matlock: One has a dog. The window frames are sitting on the ground. Warren suggested Council members send an email with the street addresses so Mr. Marinucci can address them. Matlock: The one has a garage open, but I see a man working on the house. Marinucci: We appreciate you letting us know if you see a vacant house. We are also collecting fees from rental properties now. I will send you the list. I don't believe our list is complete though.

Service-Haba: We have saved a lot of money with less snowstorms. We will begin cleaning up the flower beds soon. We are ordering 600 tons of salt the last three years as we will do in 2023. We are saving money with milder winters. He told Ms. Davis about a letter he dropped off at the double house regarding garbage cans. Warren asked about senior driveways. Haba: We did them ourselves this year. We advertise for snowplow drivers, but only got one guy we used Christmas Eve. Mayor: On Sunday morning I had to go to Euclid.I-271. The speed was 35 mph. Several trucks spun out. Haba: We didn't get anything.

*Fire-***Tapp**: The Fire Dept has completed our reporting on the I Schuman explosion and fire and have passed it onto the State. We haven't heard back yet. Environmental people and I Schuman insurance company are there. **Warren**: I gave a

summary to Mr. Pagonakis. The report went well. The communities worked together well with the leadership of our Fire Dept. **Gaither** asked about lead in the ground. **Warren**: The EPA didn't find any as of last week. **Tapp**: Monitoring is continuing. **Mayor** Envirotech and another firm are testing. **Davis** asked if the offices are open. **Tapp**: Nothing is open right now. No one is permitted in the factory.

Law-Climer: No report. Hardin asked Council to pass a resolution urging congress in the Ohio General Assembly to enact legislation to further protect the citizens from apparent injury from train derailment on the tracks located throughout the city and to urge congress to pass bill 576 the Railway Safety Act of 2023. We have tracks running through Oakwood.

Finance-Thompson: We will make the changes on the budget and will amend the exhibit to Council.

Mayoral-Mayor spoke about ViewRay's MRI guided radiation therapy machines. He stated on "March 3rd, View Ray announced the clinical team at Siteman Cancer Center in Barnes-Jewish Hospital in Washington University School of Medicine in St Louis treated its 2,000th patient using the MRIdian, MRI Guided Radiation Therapy System, In January 2014, the Siteman Cancer Center became the first to treat patients using the world's first MRI Guided Radiation Therapy System by ViewRay . The clinical team at Washington University has been a leader in publishing clinical evidence related to treating various cancers including pancreas, prostrate, lung, liver, breast, and cancerous tumors that spread to cell tissues and other organs of the body. We are excited to celebrate this key milestone after a decade of productive partnership with ViewRay. The ability to deliver on-table adaptive therapy with MRIdian has allowed us to deliver innovative cancer care to our patients to directly address the inevitable changes and movement that can take place inside the body," said Geoffery Hugo, Ph. D., Professor of Radiation Oncology and Director of Medical Physics at Siteman Cancer Center in Washington University School of Medicine. "This has brought us greater procession and control in our radiation delivery and truly changes how we treat our patients." On March 7th, View Ray announced the Czech Ministry of Health approved the purchase of an MRI Guided Radiation Therapy System to treat its patients at the Military Hospital Prague in the Czech Republic. "The acquisition of MRIdian marks a significant shift in the treatment of cancer patients throughout the Czech Republic and provides a highly sufficient and gentle cancer treatment at a world class level," said Profession Miroslav Zayoral, M.D., Ph.D., Director of the Military University Hospital Prague. "The system offers precision with unparalleled MRI quality, visualization, real-time tissue tracking, and automatic beam control while allowing for adaptation during the planning and treatment process. This allows for delivering the prescribed dose to the target while sparing surrounding healthy tissue. This results in minimizing toxicities typically associated with conventional radiation therapy." Currently 57 MRIdian systems have been installed at hospitals around the world and over 29,000 patients have been treated. Lastly, ViewRay announced on March 14th it moved the majority of its cash, cash equivalents and short-term investments held at the Silicon Valley Bank to other financial institutions with less than 5% of their investments still remaining with SVB. ViewRay said it intends to hold a "deminimis amount" with the bank going forward pending the results of SBV's closure and receivership. Secondly, a prominent State Legislator is interested in our new model of education implemented for eight years in the summer camp program which is potentially extending to a year-round learning center. I am excited over this project. It will include classes in mobile video development and management which segways into artificial intelligence, robotics, electronics, exploring careers for girls only, exploring careers in health and medicine, Young Rembrandts painting on canvas, Paul Mitchell hair and beauty class, woodworking, introduction to welding and contracting. I have two institutions interested in providing classes credited. I have to raise \$13-\$15 million, none of which comes from taxpayers' money. He shared a photo of a proposed building which includes bleachers for basketball, pickleball etc. as part of the advanced learning center. A hotel developer is interested in building a third hotel in Oakwood. The Patel Group already has Hampton and Quality Inn. He introduced me to a broker who is looking to build a Starbucks in front of the Hampton on Broadway. I met with five key players from Kroger regarding the movement forward. The roadwork going into the site will be late fall this year and fulfillment of the center will begin spring 2024. I am meeting with top officials of Cuyahoga County Dept of Development and Team NEO. It has been an active week here. Warren: The original ViewRay machine in 2003 was \$1 million. It now sells for \$6 million. Davis: Does Kroger intend to fix the landscaping on Macedonia Road? Mayor: I am meeting with them in about three weeks. That is one of the issues; fertilizing, replacing, seeding, maintaining, irrigating the ground there and

extending it 150 ft. north. If the people hadn't approved it, this wouldn't be happening. We are one of the few communities that tried commercial operations in a residential area. The only reason it happened here is because we are able to screen it all. I expect that to be done by mid-summer. Williams asked about the handout. Mayor: That is what the educational facility might look like if we secure funding. Warren asked about a location, Mayor: To the left of Mt. Zion on the Tartabini property. This will be called the Oakwood Advanced Learning Center. Williams: Are you saying Oakwood will have a center of learning? Mayor: Yes, but financing will be out of Oakwood, and we are getting our children and grandchildren in this as well as sharing it with students in Bedford school. Williams: Is this for adults? Mayor: Our summer camp is for 8–14-year-olds. Because of our older youth, 9-12 grades, in careers that will be in demand. Last year was the first year we explored careers. A State Legislator is interested in what we are doing. We use the Kahn Academy website with our youth for two weeks. This is phenomenal. The teachers we work with release creativity in the kids they work with. Things have to change in the public schools. We are bold enough to move forward. Williams: You are saying Oakwood Village will finance this? Mayor: No, not one penny. It will be a non-profit. Williams asked the hours. Mayor: That is still up for discussion. We will work with the schools on that. Also, at lunch time students will learn to prepare heart healthy menus with Kroger being here for the lunch program. Everything in this facility will be different. Matlock: The state should not be running the educational system. This is up for discussion, Williams: I don't understand. Matlock: Have we discussed this? Mayor: No, I haven't raised the money yet. Matlock: Have you discussed this with any of our Bedford, Bedford Hts., Walton Hills partners? We need to talk to the school board to utilize this facility. Mayor: This will be a model where they can send some of the students to the classes. Matlock: We have to invest in our school with the board to make it better. Williams: I am not clear, is this separate from the school? Matlock: This is separate. Perhaps make this work with the Bedford Schools. Mayor: We can in the future, This is not a charter school. Only 5.7% of our doctors are black. Why aren't the schools providing the exploration of health and medicine with our students? My own grandkids would never have been exposed to those fields. My grandson is graduating from Kent after four years will be getting \$100,000 a year for 6 months going to operating rooms assisting them. My daughter is finishing her education at Walsh Jesuit in medicine. The Finance Director's two daughters are going into medicine. Our Ward 1 Councilperson's daughter is interested in medicine. This should be promoted in the schools. Hospitals don't have enough people. This should be an elective for credit. The trades have all been forgotten as well. Williams: This should have to do with access -- where we invest our dollars. We should invest in African American demographic area. You are looking for \$13-\$15 million dollars for this when you could be getting that money for the school district. Mayor: I am not getting \$15 million from the Bill Gates Foundation to put into the School System. **Williams**: You will be in competition with the schools. **Mayor**: We will be working with them. You have to have a bigger vision on this. This could be a model for Bedford and other public schools in the State of Ohio and the country. We could have a class on Police Academy. Cities are hurting for lack of officers. This is only a proposal and I have to raise the money. Williams: Has the school district agreed to this? Mayor: We are going one step at a time. I have touched on this with them. Our kids could spend half a day at the school and half a day at this center. Why isn't there a class on the U.S. Constitution 101 and the difference between free enterprise and socialism? Very few people understand that. This will be a model. I would think Bedford will tie into this to work together. Williams: You have said in the past, Maple built new schools but yet they are still underperforming. Building a new facility but you expect it to, Mayor: Maple built new buildings when the population dropped from 38,000 to 22,000. When people are leaving, they are looking for a stronger school district. We can work with Bedford adding things to their curriculum. Williams: You expect to partner but haven't gotten partnerships with them. Mayor: We have to see if this can even happen. I have to raise the funds first. If this doesn't happen, we will just continue with our summer camp program. Williams: The schools have been talking about new schools for a while now. Mayor: I can't support that for this year. You can't go to the senior citizens in the district in this financial climate and inflation. Williams: How did you determine the location at Mt. Zion? Mayor: It isn't going to be at Mt. Zion but to the left of it. Williams: How did you determine it would be there? Mayor: Like I determined Gods will we brought in ViewRay, Thermo Fisher Scientific IBM Molecular or Oakwood Laboratories, Williams: You are going to go for the funds but what if the school doesn't want to be part of it? Mayor: Believe me when you see the institutions involved, you would jump at it. I don't want to get into that. Williams asked the timeline. Mayor: Next fall. Williams: I am trying to follow. **Mayor**: We are looking at grades 9-12. Our children, grandchildren, 30 students to a grade with 15 in a class and a total of 120 students plus 50 from Bedford. Warren: We can talk about this at a work session. Williams: He

presented something in competition with our school district. **Mayor**: You have no vision. It is not in competition. **Williams**: You don't know that. **Mayor**: It will help our inner-city youth. **Warren** stopped the discussion and hit the gavel.

Open Floor Comments:

Kevin Williams 7296 Free: I am elated about how things are shown to me as far as financials and how the city is progressing. I have been here 46 years and watched it grow. I have watched our children go through the Bedford Schools and I think about what the Mayor and Council talk about. Our children do need to expand themselves any way possible. Warren: In my generation, we had woodshop, metal and nursing in the Cleveland Public Schools. We can work together to define the possibility of this happening. If the school could adopt the concept without being competitive kids can then come out with a skill. Our market demands skills. I develop contractors. I remember public schools having specific trade training. K.Williams: Our school system needs to realize it isn't expanding. You need a skill. We have to implement programs, so they don't go to a different school system. We have to develop our system in whatever possible way. Mayor: Artificial Intelligence will take about 45% of jobs in the next five years particularly repetitive jobs.

Erica Nicholas 7230 Wright: Regarding the proposal, can you expand on the aspect of recreation. I spend extra money in other programs. Mayor: We will see tennis, basketball, volleyball, soccer, pickleball. Nicholas: I go to Twinsburg Recreation, and they have a track. Mayor asked if she takes advantage of the village discount program. Nicolas: I didn't know about it. Mayor: Talk to Dee. We encourage our residents to be fit. Hardin: The governor is bringing back phonics. Mayor: We need math and reading. Hardin: That made the news. The worst thing they could have taken out of schools is cursive. The doctrines this country was founded upon. Mayor: This model will make our district stronger if it can happen.
